LIONS CENTENNIAL COMMEMORATIVE COIN

President Barack Obama signed the International Century of Service Commemorative Coin law on Oct. 5, 2012, providing a

worthy tribute to the millions of Lions who have served their communities during the last 100 years. With the tireless work of Lions across the United States, the bill gained strong bi-partisan support before Congress passed it in September of 2012.

The US\$1 coin will be available in 2017 to celebrate Lions Clubs International's 100th anniversary. In addition to highlighting a century of charitable services to people in need, a surcharge of US\$10 for every commemorative coin sold – without any cost to taxpayers – will be donated to Lions Clubs International Foundation.



For leading the effort to build a <u>HOME</u> and changing the lives of an entire <u>FAMILY!</u>

"The Santiago Family is a family of 5 who now live their dream at 95 Friendship Street in Billerica.

Miguel works as a carpet maker in N. Billerica and Stacy a stay at home mom who takes care of her two girls and four year old son Miguel who has **Duchennes Muscular Dystrophy**. This disease is progressive and affects every muscle in his body. The Santiago's oldest child, 12 year old daughter Tatiana was diagnosed with Autism at 8 years old. Then there is 8 year old daughter Adriana. She's a big helper and loves to take care of her brother.

Before moving into their "dream home" they lived in a two bedroom apartment which was considered to be an apartment for a person with a disability. Tatiana and Adriana shared a bedroom and the second bedroom is where they keep their son's equipment. There wasn't enough space for his bed so he shared a room with his parents. Due to the lack of space, the living room was converted into the parent's bedroom. The apartment complex did not allow the children to **ride bikes or write with sidewalk chalk**. To make things harder, their van had been hit twice in the complex and attacked for parking in a handicapped spot."

The significance of the "sidewalk chalk" pictures is that, besides for the obvious needs of safety and for much improved living arrangements, the dream for the Santiago children was pretty basic and simple "to finally ride bikes and write with sidewalk chalk".

Thank you to everyone who has made their dream of home ownership possible. Thank you for believing and supporting Habitat for Humanity of Greater Lowell.

The Santiago Family, along with the help of 292 volunteers, who contributed 6137 hours, successfully completed the home you see standing before you.





An award will be presented to the winning photographers. The six (the five category winners and the Best of Show) winning photos will appear on the Lions Web site.

DO YOU KNOW YOUR CLUB CONSTITUTION?


The following questions were used in a Lions training. These are excellent for a New Member Orientation. The answers will be published in the next District Bulletin. You are encouraged to try to answer these and use them in a club meeting. If you need the answers send me an email and I will send you the original file with answers and ByLaw Cites.

- 1. All persons of legal majority may join a Lions Club.
- 2. A majority of club members must approve an application for membership.
- 3. A member is "official" once approved by the club.
- 4. A member may be expelled by a majority vote of the club membership.
- 5. Club Branch members are "associate" members of the parent Lions Club.
- 6. All Lions Clubs must have a Lions Tamer and Tail Twister.
- 7. A Club may approve a deficit budget so long as it has sufficient funds in the contingency account to cover the deficit.
- 8. A Privileged Member may be elected as a Club Officer.
- 9. A Lions Club is not assessed by LCI for Honorary members.
- 10. A Member at Large is not entitled to vote at any club, district, or International meeting or convention.
- 11. A Life Member of a Lions Club automatically becomes a Life Member of another Lions Club upon relocation to a new community.
- 12. An Associate Member may be charged Club dues in both the primary and associate clubs.
- 13. An Affiliate Member can only be elected to an office at the Club level.
- 14. A Lions Member can be a member of another service club of like character (e.g. Rotary).
- 15. A former member in good standing of one Lions Club may automatically transfer his/her membership to another Lions Club.
- 16. In order to be an active member, a Lion must attend at least one out of four meetings of his/her Lions Club.
- 17. The Club Treasurer is responsible for billing and collecting of the annual dues from the membership of a Lions Club.
- 18. No member of a Lions Club may receive compensation for services to the Lions Club.
- 19. A Lions Club is required to meet at least twice a month in order to be in good standing.
- 20. Proxy voting is permissible under special circumstances upon approval of the Club's Board of Directors.
- 21. All members who pay dues and attend meetings are deemed to be a member in "Good Standing".
- 22. Only the President may call special meetings of the Club and/or its Board of Directors.
- 23. A Club's Board of Directors is required to meet at least once a month by LCI.
- 24. Club Branch Members may vote at meetings of both the parent club and the club branch.
- 25. Robert's Rules may be suspended with the permission of the membership.

INSURANCE

- 1. All activities of a Lions Club are covered by the Association's liability insurance policy.
- 2. All Lions, Lioness and Leo members are automatically covered by the Association's insurance policy.
- 3. If a joint project is undertaken with another organization, the co-sponsor and its members are

- protected by the Association's insurance program.
- 4. The Association's insurance policy covers injuries and damage to Lions and their property occurring during the course of a Lions Club's activity or project.
- 5. The Association's insurance coverage is considered primary insurance with regard to all claims made against a Lions Club or its members.
- 6. In certain circumstances, the Association's insurance will cover liability to Lions Clubs selling or distributing liquor or alcohol as part of its project or fund raising activity.

INCORPORATION:

- 1. Incorporation protects all members from any personal liability for the activities of their Lions Club.
- 2. A Lions Club must submit its incorporation documents to LCI after filing for incorporation with the appropriate government agency.
- 3. A Lions Club may automatically use its Clubs official name as part of its corporate identity.

FUNDRAISING/ADMINISTRATION:

- 1. A Lions Club may hold a public event to raise money for its administration account so long as it clearly advertises and promotes the activity as an "Administrative Fundraiser".
- 2. A Club may deduct administrative expenses relating to a specific fundraising activity from the gross proceeds of the activity.
- 3. Interest earned on a Lions Club's activities account may be used for general administrative purposes.
- 4. Monies earned as compensation by Lions members for services rendered to other organizations may be used for administrative purposes.
 - Lions, Leos or Lioness Clubs may not do fundraising in another "clubs" home city, town or geographical area without the written permission of the local club.

ETHICAL STANDARDS

- 1. As long as a Lions member has technically complied with the Association's Code of Ethics, the member has fulfilled the Association's commitment to our founding principles.
- 2. The International Constitution mandates that all members conform their conduct to the Code of Ethics as adopted by Lions Clubs International.

TRADEMARK/EMBLEM:

- 1. The Association's name and logo are registered trademarks in countries around the world.
- 2. A Lions Club may use the Lions logo for any purpose it deems necessary and appropriate to its Lions activities.
- 3. Items bearing the Lions emblem may be sold to members of the public as long as it promotes the activities of a Lions Club.
- 4. A Lions Club must receive prior permission from LCI to reproduce the Lions logo on wearing apparel sold exclusively to its own members.

DISPUTE RESOLUTION

- 1. It is appropriate for Lions members to pursue dispute resolution through the legal system.
- 2. Members of our Association are mandated to pursue all complaints through the LCI Board established dispute resolution process.
- 3. Members may immediately seek LCI Board action in resolving disputes regarding Multiple District actions.

PRIVACY

- 1. Membership rosters are public information and may be freely disseminated to the public.
- 2. District Directories are considered public information and may be distributed to the public for non-commercial purposes only.
- 3. Personal information regarding those receiving assistance from Lions Clubs should be protected from public disclosure.
