District Governor Mid-Winter Report

Wow what a year with COVID, a year that will go down in the history books. As we look back at 2020 most club activities came to a halt and then came zoom meeting challenges. Our Lions have been tested as we cope with uncertainty, we learn new skills on how to serve and we continue to serve through it all!

We are halfway through our year together, and the rest will go quickly. Let us continue to work towards achieving our goals in membership and serving the community.

There are a lot of clubs working hard with their communities and giving back to those in need. We must continue to work outside the box and do so safely.

I would like to thank my cabinet for all they have done. Thank you to my NAMI team (North America Membership Initiative) who are working together as a team to help grown membership in our District. Thank you to our Council Chair Joni Baptiste **"It's Easy When You Love it"**. Thank you to my Mid-Winter committee.

A special thank you to my GST (Global Service Team) Laura Ward for thinking outside the box. Her first District project was to raise money for Childhood Cancer. Her team decorated toilet bowls and planted them on people's lawns without notice and signage that said, "flush out childhood cancer." In order to have the decorated toilet bowl removed, they had to make a donation. We raised \$1500 for childhood cancer and donated to the Children's Hospital in Boston.

Next was a District food drive. With the help of the LCIF grant for \$5000, and the District, we were able to supply the Merrimack Valley Food Bank with 300 turkeys and fixings totaling nearly 7,600 pounds, as well as additional checks and gift cards. The contributions translated into more than 3,600 meals for residents for Thanksgiving.

Our next project with our GST Laura was to see if clubs were interested in purchasing the **"Chad's Bracket"** wagon, here a little history on the wagon: Roger Leggett's granddaughter Felicity was diagnosed with a brain tumor at the age of four. During visits to see her, Roger and his son Chad discovered that many pediatric patients were transported in Radio Flyer wagons, with their IV poles trailing behind the wagon. They knew there had to be an easier and safer way to affix the IV pole to the wagon, and when Chad tragically

passed away, Roger honored Chad's legacy by creating [Chad's Bracket](#). To this day, Chad's Bracket continues to help families and make a difference in people's lives.

Various Lions clubs purchased a total of 10 *Chad's Bracket* wagons which will be distributed to local hospitals in the Spring.

I would like to thank John Lucente, our District Eye Recycling person, and the Lexington Lions Club for organizing a shipment of 36,000 pairs of eyeglasses to ship to Africa. If you have a moment, please watch the video.

District dues: Due to the COVID pandemic, there have been changes in our district budget. It was decided to not charge the clubs with the second half District dues, and we decided to pay the Multiple District dues for all our clubs.

This has been a challenging year for the world, but **"We are Stronger together"** and let's continue our Motto **"We Serve."** Let us keep our clubs strong so we can meet those challenges together. Let us continue to deliver hope to our communities. Let us continue to innovate and serve safely. Let us continue to keep our eyes and hearts open to new opportunities to make a difference every day in people's lives. Together, we can build a better future for our families, communities, and the world we share. But most of all, stay safe and prioritize the health and safety of your families.

KIDSIGHT

At the end of August, 25 Lions from MD 33 and 13 Lions from New York participated in the Lions KidSight USA training. The course was held on Zoom by PID Dr. Edward Cordes. A certification exam was given following the course. District 33N had 3 Lions who attended and passed and are now certified screeners for the district. When the course is offered again, we would like to see more Lions take part in this opportunity.

Childhood Cancer Awareness

The human line of hope Across America took place on September 13. We had Lions from different clubs who registered and came together to participate. We chose to spell the word CARE in support of those who have lost or are battling cancer. The line of hope campaign continues to help benefit research and bring an end to childhood cancer.

You've Been Flushed a fundraiser for Childhood Cancer ran from September 13th - October 13th. A committee of five members was set up along with the GST to help with the project. This fundraiser was meant to be fun and get people involved throughout the district during a time when we could not be in social gatherings. We had four painted toilets decorated with flowers that someone could place on a person's lawn for a fee. **We raised \$1500.00 for Childhood Cancer.**

Chad's Bracket Wagons – The wagons allow for transport around the facility and have a medical IV pole attached. Each wagon costs \$400.00 and come with an engravable bracket. District 33N is working with three hospitals; Winchester, Lowell General, and Emerson, where

we will be presenting the donated wagons. The following clubs have purchased wagons: Woburn Breakfast. 1 wagon, Lowell, 2 wagons, Tewksbury, 1 wagon, Concord, 2 wagons, Governor Marcel Plouffe, 1 wagon. I have been working on this project with the help of Tammy Gray, Joseph Ward and Stacie Whittier, who have helped with ordering and communications. We will continue to work together to organize presentations at the facilities when the pandemic allows for us to be on the grounds. The current plan is for early spring for the presentations. I assisted District K with 3 donated wagons, and they paid us for shipping.

HUNGER

GOBBLE UP HUNGER 365 As we want nothing more than to make a difference. On Saturday November 7th, District Governor Marcel Plouffe, along with the clubs of District 33N, joined forces with the Merrimack Valley Food Bank to collect food for those in need. We received a \$5000.00 Community Impact Grant from LCIF to assist in donating Thanksgiving Dinner for families. We had more than a dozen Club members come to help support the event from (Haverhill, Tanner City, North Andover, Salisbury, Lowell, Dunstable-Tyngsborough, Woburn Host, and Ipswich). The donations included 300 turkeys, 900 pounds of potatoes, and other fixings totaling close to 7,600 pounds. We also received additional checks and gift cards. All donations provided more than 3,600 meals for residents in the Merrimack Valley. District 33N would like to thank Market Basket and Store Manager John Savastas for his help and generosity through the Gobble Up Hunger Campaign. We made a huge impact!

I just want to mention a few clubs who have continued to make a huge impact on Hunger throughout this time of need, your efforts have not gone unnoticed. I personally thank you and appreciate all that you are doing every meal, can good, dollar makes a difference.

Shoe City - Prepares lunch and dinner bags for My Brothers Table. They also did Thanksgiving food baskets for families in need.

Concord - Standing at Crosby's Marketplace collecting food and or donations for Open Table a local food pantry and community meals program.

Dunstable-Tyngsborough - Collected donations for End 68 hours of Hunger, provided Thanksgiving food baskets for town residents, served hot meals to the homeless, provided snacks for the homeless of Greater Merrimack Valley area.

Townsend and Tewksbury - Working diligently with their local pantries.

Danvers - delivered 96 meals to seniors and shut ins in the community.

Newburyport - Over 2000 meals!

Salisbury - provided Thanksgiving baskets and meals to seniors and town residents.

Woburn Middlesex - has donated food and gift cards to the Woburn Council of Social Concern Food Pantry.

Coats for Kids- District 33N has taken part in Anton's Cleaners sponsored "Coats for Kids" Program. In these difficult times more than ever, donated new and gently used warm winter coats for children and adults of all sizes are needed and our Lions have certainly stepped up

with the collections. Fantastic job to Wyoma and Shoe City for bringing in over 1200 coats. Lexington Lions have collected over 568 and are still processing some. To all the other participating clubs; job well done.

Matthew 25 Homeless Projects - Matthew 25 Homeless Projects goes out and feeds 75-85 hot meals a night in the Merrimack Valley Area. They also provide these individuals with clothing, blankets, toiletries, socks, shoes, and basic needs.

The District has donated over 850 pairs of socks, 10 bags of gently used clothing (male and female), boots, sneakers, rain gear, gloves, hats, mittens, and blankets. Hot food, snacks, water, masks, personal size sanitizer. This continues to be an ongoing project in the district. If anyone would like to help, please contact me.

Kindness Collaborative - Is an Andover based group, that was started by two moms who wanted to make a difference in their community during COVID-19. To this date, it has grown to the point they have gone as far east as Boston and started to spread gestures of Kindness into New Hampshire. The types of projects they are working on range from making meals for the homeless in Lawrence, as well as meals for Frontline COVID-19 clinic workers, baked goods, collecting sheets and towels for shelters, no sew blankets for children in Groton hospital, books and craft supplies, surgical caps, masks, knitted mittens, hats, scarves and blankets. As Lions, we have stepped up to help support the Merrimack Valley Communities and partnered with this group. Where there is a need there is a lion!

Sheets and towel Donations- I put a request out for donations needed and members of Tanner City Lions stepped up. Katie Sirois cleaned out a closet and Tammy Gray hit up Amazon. Dunstable -Tyngsborough Lions collected bags of sheets and towels as well. All the donations were being sent to The Psychological House-Daybreak, Pegasus House, and Women's View-Pegasus House.

Surgical Caps/Knitting Project- This is a great service project to do from the safety of your own home. You can make a difference in service with both those that are in need and our Frontline workers. Currently District 33N has already dropped off a large donation of knitted hats, mittens, snacks, and surgical masks.

Educational Event for Pre-Diabetes Awareness

COVID-19 concerns prevented normal event gatherings and fundraisers, so I used the time in the summer and fall to research and plan a virtual diabetes awareness event. After researching potential topics and speakers (and after many emails and phone calls), I decided to focus this event on pre-diabetes education and prevention. The Joslin Diabetes Center in Boston was a great resource – they love the Lions and appreciate the Lions’ contributions to research.

Dr. Joanna Mitri, MD, MS, from the Joslin Diabetes Center, was chosen as our speaker. Dr. Mitri is a Staff Physician and Research Associate at Joslin, and an Instructor in Medicine at Harvard Medical School. Dr. Mitri’s medical specialties are lifestyle-based interventions, prevention, and management of type 2 diabetes and cardio metabolic disease. We were very fortunate to get a speaker with such knowledge on the topic. Once Dr. Mitri was confirmed, the District Governor requested that the presentation be a district-wide event, rather than the Haverhill Lions only.

Dr. Mitri’s presentation occurred on November 30. We were thrilled to have Dr. Mitri speak to our group, and over 75 people attended the virtual event. She was an engaging speaker who did a great job of explaining the science of research on diabetes prevention and treatment and took the time to answer questions from participants. Dr. Mitri also provided a digital handout for participants that is a great resource of information on:

- The prevalence and causes of type 2 diabetes.
- Diagnosis of type 2 diabetes
- Management of type 2 diabetes
- Prevention of type 2 diabetes (see attached document, “The Science of Diabetes”)

As a follow-up to her presentation, Dr. Mitri is working on educational materials that we can share with District 33N clubs via social media. These materials should be ready by mid-February. I will also continue to support diabetes awareness via Facebook posts,

communications with district members, and assisting with any questions (for example, outreach about Diabetes Awareness Month in November and the 100,000 Minutes Initiative).

Other Events

On November 24, for an additional presentation during Diabetes Awareness Month, I arranged for Haverhill Lions member Dr. John Bona to speak to our club. John is an Optometrist and spoke about diabetes and its effects on the eyes. He shared a wealth of knowledge and the members really enjoyed the Zoom presentation and the chance to ask questions.

We held a successful fundraiser for Massachusetts Lion Eye Research Fund (MLERF) in December, and plan to host another fundraiser in the spring.

2021 MD 33 State Convention Committee Report

This year is another challenging year for Lions of MD 33. We were supposed to have our state convention meeting at the Sea Crest Resort in Falmouth, Ma on April 23-25, 2021. Our guest for the Convention is 1st VP of Lions International, Douglas X. Alexander from the Brooklyn Bedford Stuyvesant Lions Club New York, his partner in service is Stability Cazabon..
