Networks Are Us?

Times are constantly changing and the reasons for joining a service organization are constantly changing with the times. Educational systems nearly, without exception, mandate that all students perform a certain number of hours of community service as a prerequisite to receiving a diploma. This process enables students to serve their communities and to become more civically minded.

When a person interacts with the community at large they in fact work with people that they would not have met under normal circumstances. This interaction is for the lack of a better term, called networking. The service that you are performing fulfills a need and the people you interact with may be valuable contacts for future life endeavors.

I encourage all service organizations to reach out to other like minded organizations in search of a common ground service project. These networks can enhance fund raising efforts and naturally spread the work load over a broader network of workers. More hands will often make a project more manageable. A good example of this would be a club that hosts a road race. They have the expertise required to manage the event but lack the personnel to police the crowds and oversee function tasks such as manning the watering stations. These areas could be staffed by Leos, another community organization or even another Lions Club from a neighboring town or community.

Whatever profits your efforts do reap can be divided as per an onset agreement. The service project itself will also introduce participants to the membership of a different organization. It is possible that another organizations members may join your organization based on the work ethics and personalities of your clubs participants.
