thought it might be interesting to look at the process beyond those Advisory Meeting drop offs. Last month I paid tribute to the Lexington Lions for their part in this process. This month I will highlight the program successes and feature the dedication of the Lowell Lions Club.

Since April of 2018, our program has donated over 18,000 pairs of eyeglasses for distribution by groups who do medical missions.

Here are some of the groups that are doing this wonderful work:

Rev. Ken Whitten, Vision International Missions 8500 pairs to go to Haiti, Honduras, Guatemala, Ghana and Sudan.

John Godoy of VISTA, 6500 pairs for distribution in Peru, Nicaragua and Guatemala.

Tom and Judy Gordon of the First Congregational Church in Wakefield 1450 pairs that went to Niger with the help of many of the congregation.

Dr. Vicki Kvedar of North Shore Ophthalmologists 1100 pairs for her annual pilgrimage to the "Be Like Britt "Orphanage in Haiti.

This is something that Dr. Vicki has been doing with her daughter during their Christmas break since the orphanage opened.

Ray and Judy Spiecker, of Gloucester, 950 pairs for their mission Sponsored by St. Jerome's Roman Catholic Church in Weymouth, MA to Costanza, Dominican Republic, and Mazantenango, Guatemala sponsored by Partners in Development, based in Ipswich, MA

Special praise to the Lowell Lions who have been doing great work, cleaning, reading the glasses for the proper prescription and packing them individually. They have secured space at the Lowell Senior Center and have enlisted a special lady, Joanne Deck (not a Lion) who has processed over 6000 pairs since June and shows no sign of slowing down.. There are many Lowell Lions who have contributed so much namely Tammy Roussell, PDG Len Tarmey, Dick Provencher, Dr. George Montminy and Marcel Plouffe.

The Lowell club has made the recycling effort a successful community project engaging volunteers across local high schools, universities, senior care residential facilities, and church / civic groups resulting in hundreds of hours of local support. In addition to the Lowell Senior Center, much of the volunteer work has been supported with free access to space at the First United Baptist Church in Lowell.

The greatest need we have for the program is a destination for the eyeglasses that we all collect. Many people that you come in contact with on a daily basis, at work, school, the club, church know someone who does medical missions. 
