If a host family or anyone else would like to volunteer as a supervisor and/or mentor at the camp we will provide all meals and accommodations for them for the week. Great news! We have added 85 NEW Lions to our membership in the District. That's more than one per club, and I want to shout out to all the Sponsors of these new Lions. Thank you for showing leadership to your club and the district, and for being mentors to these new Lions.

I also want to emphasize that your new members are the responsibility of all club members to welcome them to your club and to involve them in club projects and functions, listen to them and encourage their ideas at meetings.

The unfortunate news is that we have dropped 87 members so we are currently at -2 members. We know we lose a few members every year to natural causes and that is sad. However we have lost approximately 70 members this year due to dissatisfaction of Lions with their Clubs, and that, my fellow Lions, is an issue that ALL Lions need to address. We are a district in transition and for the Lions who have been through this before you know that it comes with consequences, which we may not wish to happen.

There is a simple solution and with a little bit of math, had we retained 50% of members, which if we had did this in the 2012 -2013 year we would have 35 retained members and instead of sitting at 1227 members we would have 1262 and be growing. HOWEVER, I would like to have seen us retain 100%. 



Cecile's story: A mother perspective of raising a deaf child



wanted to tell you about an but I have had some difficulty in getting together with him, so instead. I want to tell you about another amazing child or adult now, that I know.

The date was Thanksgiving, October 15, 1962 and our first child, our daughter Noreen, was born. Little was my husband Ron and I prepared to deal with a handicapped child. However, that is what we had to do. At that time, no hearing tests were done on newborn babies so her deafness went unnoticed for a time. In fact, it would not be noticed until she was about 4 years old

When we found that our daughter was deaf, our world was grey, how were we going to cope? I was sitting at the sewing machine watching my daughter out in the sand box playing. As most children do, she picked up a toy and started to wander down the driveway with it. I banged on the window a couple of times and realized that she wasn't hearing me. I raced out side to chase after her, but by the time I even got near her, she was already down the street. It wasn't until I touched her shoulder that she even knew I was there.



Lately, Noreen told me that she wasn't deaf; she was severely hard of hearing. Can you imaging your child standing there with a funny look on her face and her finger waving in front of your face trying to explain the difference from being profoundly deaf to

back and forth from Elgin on Sunday to Winnipeg and then back to Elgin on Friday. She travelled the Greyhound bus back and forth until she graduated from her school with her grade nine. From there she went on to Red River College and took a filing course and worked at the college for a few years.

The drivers for the bus were a hero for us, as our daughter travelled back and forth. They took care of her and gave her help and comfort when she needed it. Shortly after she quit travelling the road, the bus line was stopped to Elgin. I honestly think the bus line was kept open because she needed it to go to school and back to home.

At her graduation, along with all her schoolmates that were graduating, they had a great program and music. It's a unique experience as there is not the noise level that is normally at a hearing social event. Those

severely hard of hearing. I never did figure out the difference. I do have to explain here that she was not dumb. She could talk and some words she did learn to say I really wouldn't repeat here. I have no idea where she did learn them. The word "deaf and dumb" are erroneous, and dumb means that there is no capability of ever talking. Deaf (and I will use that term here as it is easier to use) can and at times do talk, in fact, there are deaf people that can talk.

Noreen worked at a number of jobs throughout the years, such as file clerk, and in most of the jobs that she worked at that was her jub duty. She was also an ATM money counter for a major bank, a counsellor for other deaf people, taught sign language within the Winnipeg School system and at other institutions. She is a mother of three hearing children and a grandmother of three hearing granddaughters.

Noreen and her spouse Peter have been married for 27 years now and own their own home in Winnipeg. Her father Ronald and I did take a sign language course so that we could talk with her, but since we did not see her on a regular basis, we lost what we had learned. Still, however, we retained enough for some of the language. I have to tell her to slow down as her hands move so fast, I cannot read the signs. This is where she so patiently sighs and tells me to get some paper and pencils. While she was growing up, we used every bit of paper that could be written on, no paper went to waste.

Up through the years while we saw her on weekends, we made sure that she was in contact with other members and branches of both of the families. She was treated the same as her brothers were. She was taught right from wrong, but of course, she was a child just like others and didn't like to be told what to do. Now she laughs about it all.

Noreen has had set backs with finding jobs, her health and in coping with three hearing children. But she has triumphed with it all. Noreen and Peter had three hearing dogs throughout the time while the children were growing up. She explained that they were great in keeping her updated as to what they were doing. Currently, she says that she feels that she can cope without one.

She cried when something went wrong and wanted to know how to fix it and then proceeded to do so and if she didn't know how, she turned to those that did know. She laughs with glee at her life in spite of those set backs she has faced. She is a tolerant loving person, who loves her family and friends with a passion that is rare to see.

To Noreen: She is my daughter and she has filled my life with the knowledge that while life throws us curves, we can follow the curves and find wonderful things at the end of it. She taught me that curves can be a wonderful thing. There is so much more that could be said on her behalf, but it would fill a book.

that's what they gave me, 700 pairs."

The glasses included everything from bifocals, reading glasses and sunglasses with prescription.

According to the Secretary of the San Pedro Lions, Bonnie Musbach, the glasses will be distributed throughout the country with 100 pairs being given to each zone president. Further to this, Musbach will be trained through the Belize Council for the Visually Impaired BCVI to administer primary vision tests.

With this skill, she hopes to travel to the southern districts along with President Murlene Spain and past president Melanie Paz where they will be issuing test and glasses to those individuals in need.

The team plans on hitting areas such as Punta Gorda, Placencia, Seine Bight and Dangriga among other places in the south. President Spain is very excited for the donation and assures Kerensted that the glasses will certainly reach the individuals that need them the most.

The San Pedro Lions Club hosts eye doctors from BCVI the first Wednesday of each month. The doctors will be back on the island on March 6th and 7th when they will be offering free eye exams and services.
