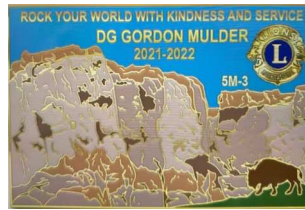

RLLI, Regional Lions Leadership Institute, is scheduled for this fall. It is a leadership training program that would benefit all Lions membership. It would/will help each person in their personal life, their jobs, and also in their own Lions clubs.

LCIF. Campaign 100. There was a big push in fundraising at the end of the last Lions year. Thanks to all for what you did. This, 2021-2022, is the last year of Campaign 100. The aggressive fundraising campaign that was started three years ago, in an effort to establish a large enough base amount to fund Lions programs around the world, has one more year to go to finish out to reach the goal of \$300,000,000.00. The current total of funds raised is \$210,623,793.40

A few weeks ago I had the opportunity to explain 'Lions' to someone who knew almost nothing about Lions. Easy peasy, we are the world's largest service organization, 1.4 million strong worldwide. Where there is a need, there is a Lion.

Saying that I was trying to remember what mnemonic 'Lions' stood for, my nephew—being young and computer literate, grabbed his phone and looked it up. Liberty, intelligence, our nations safety. Considering the time frame Lions was established, it fits perfectly. Two weeks ago, at a Lions foundation meeting, I was informed of another mnemonic phrase. Loving individuals, offering needed service. Who are we? What do we do? 'Lions'. Loving individuals, offering needed services!

It's a new dawn, it's a new day....

It's a good day to be a Lion! Serve with pride, with the Lions' pride.

This month I am sharing the story of Jaxson and his autism assist dog Natalie. "He came out of his shell," says Andrea, speaking of when her 8-year-old son, Jaxson, received Autism Assist Dog Natalie from Can Do Canines in late 2020. Jaxson, who has a combination of diagnoses in addition to autism, including anxiety, used to struggle to be by himself. Andrea explains that not only was Jaxson afraid of leaving their Prior Lake house, he couldn't even go into a different room of the home, including the bathroom, without someone else. Natalie's loving and calm presence has changed that. Andrea says, "He seems a lot less worried about being alone." She illustrates, "Once Jax recognized that Natalie was going to stay with him and be his dog, I just saw the day his heart opened up to her. He was just petting her and looking at her with these little googly eyes and he said, 'Mom, my heart is so happy right now with Natalie.' To hear him say that and to hear him welcome that into his heart and mind and into his routine and into his life, it's a really big deal. It's not an easy thing for Jax to do. It was really amazing."

The feeling is mutual, as Andrea explains that Natalie "100% knows that he's her boy." And boy does she show it. Incredibly affectionate, Natalie's sweet temperament can defuse escalating situations quickly. Andrea notes that Natalie has the uncanny "ability to bring Jax down a notch." She can sense when Jax needs a healthy distraction and approaches him to offer a wet kiss.

Jax isn't the only beneficiary of her loving personality though. "She has such a calm demeanor that she helps the whole family to take a step back sometimes and say 'chill out, no big deal,'" shares Andrea. "You can tell she's one of those dogs that's adaptable to every situation. She just wags her tail and says 'okay, whatever you want to do.'"

One way that Natalie especially helped was with online schooling. Before Natalie, Jax found sitting through a Zoom session confusing and difficult. With Natalie next to him and ready to nuzzle at a moment's notice, he actively participated in classes, both responding to questions and offering his own insights and information.

Giving Him a Shot of Courage

For Andrea, though, one particular experience stands out for how Natalie has affected Jax. During a doctor's appointment—something Jax particularly finds traumatic—he had to receive a shot. Normally, this would entail two or three nurses helping Andrea to restrain Jax. However, as Jax sensed his anxiety spiraling, he lay down on the floor next to Natalie. As Andrea describes, "She started licking his face, and they snuggled on the floor for five to ten minutes. All of sudden, Jax stood up, and lifted up his sleeve, and held out his arm so the nurse could give him a shot. And he just stood there and did it and he was so brave. He never would have been able to overcome that anxiety on his own like that. I didn't say anything. I didn't do anything. I just had to sit there and give them the time that they needed, and he just did it." Recalling that this event happened only about two weeks after Natalie had entered their lives, she says, "I knew Natalie would make positive changes in our life, but I was not expecting that dramatic of a difference."

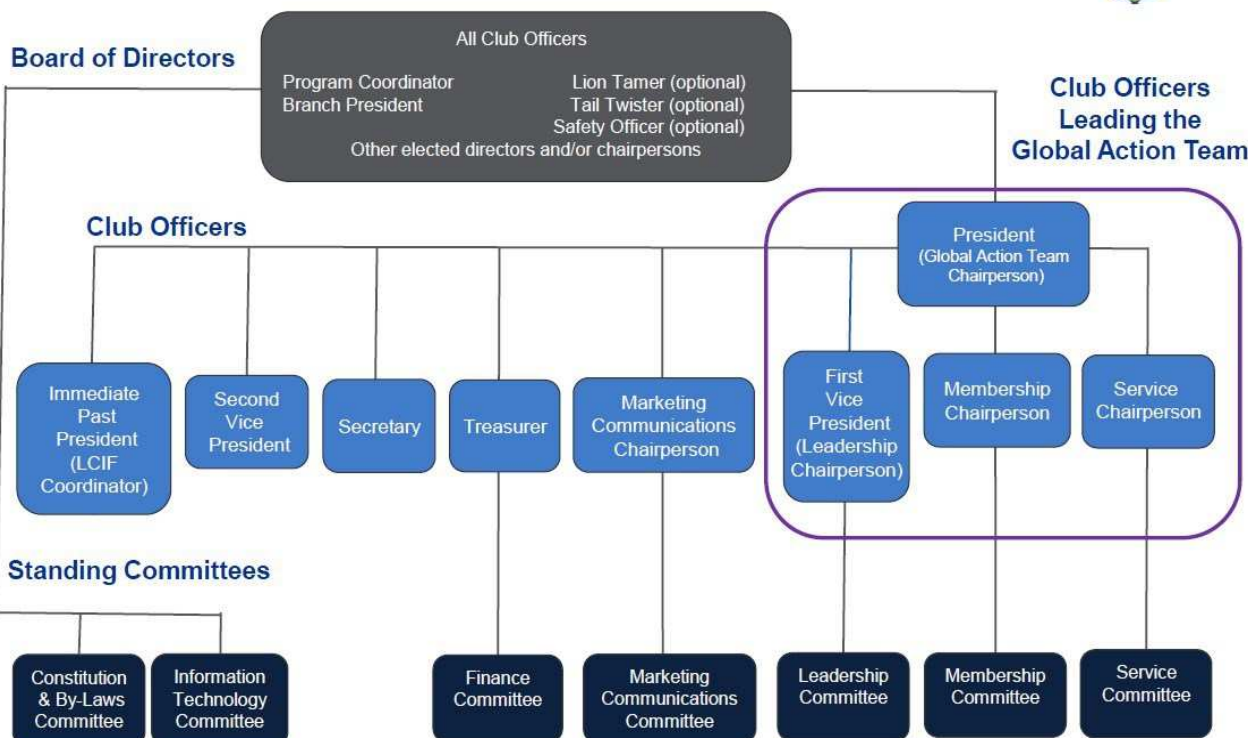

Please note that all nominations should be submitted electronically to serviceactivities@lionsclubs.org. Lions Clubs International will not accept physical applications.

- **July 1 to October 31:** Nominations are open
- **August 15:** Deadline for club service chairpersons and Leo club presidents to electronically send one nomination to the district global service team (D GST) coordinator
- **September 15:** Deadline for D GST coordinator to electronically send one nomination to the multiple district (MD) GST coordinator
- **October 31:** Deadline for MD GST coordinator to electronically send one nomination to Lions Clubs International
- **January:** Winners are selected by the Lions Clubs International Board of Directors Service Activities Committee; winning clubs notified
- **March:** Winning clubs to receive their award from Lions Clubs International

Nominations are due August 15 to GST Chair David Janssen.

Each district has the opportunity to send six (6) participants; however, if other districts do not meet their allotment, your district may send additional Lions.

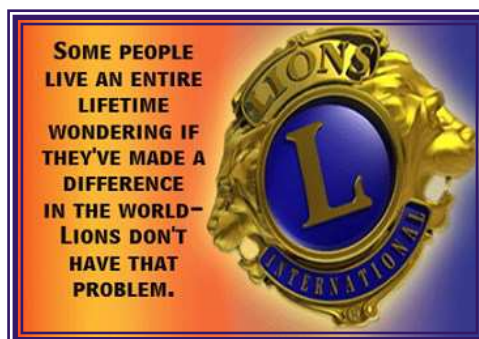
