LITPC YOUTH SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION



The Lions International Trading Pin Club (LITPC) has announced for the 2020-2021 school year that there will be 3 US \$2,500 scholarships awarded. Graduating Leos OR graduating sons/daughters, grandsons/granddaughters of Lions or Lioness are eligible to apply for the LITPC Youth Scholarship. The LITPC goal is to help our future leaders and give students a financial helping hand. This program started in 2012. Recipients have been from Georgia, Iowa, Louisiana, Minnesota (2), New York (2), Ohio (3), Oklahoma (2), Pennsylvania (2) and Virginia (3). The 2021 recipients will be announced at the LITPC Pin Traders Annual Breakfast in June, 2021.

Selection of the scholarship recipients will be based on academic achievement, an essay stating the student's goals, a statement of reason(s) for applying and an overview of work, community and school service, and letters of recommendation.

Please follow the instructions, fill out **ALL** the forms neatly and correctly which includes the 4 essay questions (in 350 words or less) and the question about scholarships that you have been offered along with submitting a certified copy of your high school transcript including activities. Plus you also need to attach recommendations from 2 persons (i.e. teacher, coach, clergy, employer, etc.) AND attach a recommendation letter from a Lions Club member indicating the name of the Club and state/province and country in which the Club is located.

Here are some awards that you should be considering: Melvin Jones Fellowship, one award for each donation of \$1000 to LCIF. Plus if anyone already has a MJF, they are eligible for a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowship. Any questions let DG David Janssen know or call our District LCIF chair, 1VDG Gordon Mulder.

Next, is the Al Jensen Leadership Award. (page 10-11) Each District Governor can nominate one Lion who has been a member for five years or more and has served at the District or Multiple District level. This nomination has to be submitted no later than March 1st of each year. For award criteria see the MD5M website or give me a call.

MD5M Hall of Fame Award. (see following page) Each District can award one Hall of Fame Award at the MD5M convention each year. This award honors those Lions who have demonstrated the highest level of commitment and dedication to the efforts of their club, district, or multiple district and the motto of our association, "We Serve". Nominees must be a member in good standing for at least 15 years and must be at least two years removed from the Council of Governors if a PDG. A candidate can be nominated by any Lion, or Lions Club. This nomination must be received by the District Governor at least <u>30 days prior to the Districts</u> <u>Mid-Winter Convention</u>. Nominations will be voted on at the Mid-Winter Convention each year. A \$150 check is needed with the application to cover the cost of the award.

Hall of Fame

Purpose

To honor those Lion and Lioness members of character and substance who have demonstrated the highest level of commitment and dedication to the efforts of their club, district or multiple district and the motto of our association, "We Serve."

Award

There shall be a maximum of one (1) recipient of the MD5M Hall of Fame Award per district, inducted into the MD5M Hall of Fame each year. The award may be presented posthumously. The MD5M Hall of Fame award recipients are to be inducted into the Hall of Fame at the annual MD5M Multiple District Convention during the Saturday noon luncheon.MD5M Hall of Fame recipients shall receive a MD5M Hall of Fame award plaque and a Hall of Fame lapel pin in recognition of their induction in the MD5M Hall of Fame. In addition, a complete listing of all MD5M Hall of Fame recipients shall appear in the annual MD5M

directory and a perpetual plaque, with the names of all inductees and the year of their induction inscribed thereon, shall be kept in a prominent place in the MD5M office, when available. The presentation of the MD5M Hall of Fame inductees shall be the responsibility of the current International Director from MD5M, if there is one and he/she is in attendance at the MD5M

Multiple District Convention. If not, then the most recent Past International Director having served from MD5M in attendance at the MD5M Multiple District Convention.

Criteria

A candidate may be a Lion or Lioness, must have been a member in good standing for at least 15 years, be at least two (2) years removed from the Council of Governors if a PDG, should have qualifications above and beyond the call of duty including social and human endeavors, and he/she should be of good moral character and have a good reputation in his/her community. A nominee must be a member in good standing of a Lions or Lioness Club, or must have been a member in good standing of a Lions or Lioness Club at the time of their death.

Process

A candidate may be sponsored by any Lion, Lioness, Lions Club, Lioness Club, Zone, or District. There shall be a nomination fee of \$150.00 per each candidate nominated. The nomination fee shall be returned to those sponsors whose candidates are not elected for induction into the MD5M Hall of Fame. The nomination fee for those selected for induction shall be sent to

MD5M and shall be used to offset the cost of the award process, plaques and pin. Nominations, including the nomination fee, must be received by the District Governor at least 30 days prior to the District's Midwinter Convention.

Each individual District shall annually hold an election at their Midwinter Convention to determine the candidate(s), if any, to be inducted into the Hall of Fame for that Lion Year. Each sponsor shall have an opportunity to give a brief presentation on the merits and biographical information of their nominee prior to the election. Those elected to be inducted into the MDSM

Hall of Fame shall not be publicly announced until their induction at the MD5M Multiple District Convention.

All nominations shall use the standard form, no others shall be accepted. The nomination fee must be received at the time the application is received, otherwise the nomination shall not be considered. All successful candidates shall be inducted into the MD5M Hall of Fame at the next MD5M Multiple District Convention. The sponsor(s) and the respective District Governor shall ensure that the honoree or a suitable representative shall be in attendance at the MD5M Multiple District Convention Saturday Luncheon when the honorees are inducted. A brief biography of each inductee shall be announced to those in attendance during the induction ceremony at the annual MD5M Multiple District Convention.

Appendix 26.0 LION AI JENSEN LEADERSHIP AWARD Selection Criteria

Selection Process:

- One or two awards may be presented annually to Lions who have been members for five years or more.
- The candidates' selection must be bases only on contributions at a District or Multiple level.
- Each District Governor shall annually nominate no more than one Lion to receive the award.
- The nomination must be on the official nomination form, signed by the District Governor and submitted to the Council Chair each year no later than March 1.
- Final selection of the award recipients shall be made by a committee of the seated Council Chair and the two previous Council Chairs.

Selection Criteria:

The award shall be presented to the most qualified Lions nominated for the award, based on the following criteria:

Leadership Characteristics:

- Vision... The ability to see or seek out new ideas and new ways to advance the humanitarian service of Lionism.

These kits can be given to Lions members to begin with and then to people who are identified in the community.

Environment-

- Clean up side of road and sidewalk during your daily walks. Enjoy a diabetic-friendly lunch together after working. (Also s the Diabetic global cause.) addre
- Adopt A Drain Clean leaves and other debris away from around and top of road drains to avoid water backup during heavy rain storms
- Plant small flower garden in area in your community that needs enhancement. Planting gardens or putting flower pots around town
- Donate your newspaper and magazine to others instead of throwing in the garbage.
- Co-sponsor a recycling event with a local city or town and a recycling facility to collect hazardous items that shouldn't go in the trash, paint, etc. Offer free paper shredding as well.
- Make a decorative Winter container garden or a container garden that feeds the birds. A Lions Club can partner with a local nursery and funds raised will be used to support the Lions' environmental projects.
- Bird Feeders Make a variety of treats that will feed and sustain birds and wildlife throughout the winter including bird feeders using cookie cutters; suet-filled orange halves; popcorn and cranberry garlands, and more. These could be made at a Lions meeting just for the Lions or do a community event so more birds are fed in the community.
- Collect used blue jeans, wash them, and then cut out pieces using patterns supplied by Sole Hope. The pieces are assembled into "shoe kits" and then shipped to Sole Hope who then sends them in Uganda. In Uganda, seamstresses and • cobblers create shoes that are given to children who suffered from jiggers and were treated for them. Jiggers are tiny parasitic insects that burrow into the feet, lay eggs that multiple greatly in size. They can cause pain, itchiness, swelling, infection, and even death. A pair of jeans - destined for the trash - literally can save a child's life! The Scandia-Marine Lions Club has done this project twice and each time it was very well received. https://splehope.org/

- Collect t-shirts that people no longer want to wear. Wash them and make them into diapers for newborns. The diapers are used as incentives in third-world <u>countries</u> so mothers get prenatal care and deliver their babies in hospitals or centers offering medical care. Sponsor the design and painting of a mural in your local town of city that focuses on nature and wildlife of the area, and that beautifies the community. Work with an artist who will create the design and create a "paint by number" mural that people from the community can help paint under the guidance of the artist.
- Make tree trail work with local youth (elementary school and teens) to create a tree trail highlighting the diversity of trees that are growing in your community plus ones that will survive into the future with climate change
- Collect cans. Turn these in afterward and use the proceeds to support an environmental project.
- Collect Can tabs: Clubs can collect tabs for a charity of choice. Just an easy project without investment. Collect for Shriners or they can also be collected for the Ronald McDonald House.
- Recycle sneakers so they can be transformed into Nike Grind material which is used in performance products and sport surfaces. The Reuse-A-Shoe program recycles athletic shoes at the end of their life, giving them a new life through Nike Grind. Bring shoes to the Lions event and they will be brought to the Nike store in Eagan, MN. Any brand of athletic sneakers is accepted. However, Nike is unable to recycle sandals, dress shoes, boots, or shoes with metal [like cleats or snikes!
- Recycle medical equipment (e.g., crutches, wheelchairs, scooters) to create a "library" of items that can be checked out at no cost and used until no longer needed. When done with the item, it should be returned to the Medical Equipment Library (MEL). Each club or zone could establish a MEL.
- Have a plant swap. People bring in their plants that they are dividing and/or no longer want. Each needs to be in its own container. They can also take a plant from the ones that are at the swap. If there are leftover plants, Lions and other olunteers can take them and plant them in their gardens.
- Sand and varnish "tree cookies" for use in classrooms throughout Minnesota. Help classroom teachers across Minnesota teach children how trees and other woody plants grow, factors that affect tree growth, and tree identification. Teachers love having sets of cookies like these in their classrooms but don't have time or tools to make them. The DNR needs volunteers to create "tree cookies" -- slices of branches or trunks that show the rings of a tree. 100 cookies supplies three classes of students, so the more that can be made, the better:

- Build bluebird houses or other types of birdhouses. Install these at a later date at a state park (with permission) or in a city park (again, with permission). The Lions would need to check on these feeders and clean them out unless someone from the state or city would do that.
- Recycles plastic bags and plastic packaging and gives back with a bench for

- Winterize plan outdoor activities like helping winterize gardens, plant something in a local park or clean up some trash in

Hunger -

- Food for Seniors Shop and deliver food for at-risk seniors.
- Prepare and/or serve food at Loaves and Fishes https://www.loavesandfishesmn.org/
- Launch a food pantry on a college campus during National Hunger Awareness Month. Pack food (purchase it as well) to create "Backpack Food packs" for youth in our community in need. Reach out to public,
- charter, and homeschool co-ops. Provide nutritious food (not typical food shelf macaroni and cheese, ramen noodles, etc. that promote diabetes)
- Make "Blessing Boxes" for Thanksgiving include turkey, canned goods, produce, pie, etc. as well as Thanksgiving napkins, plates, and a centerpiece. Also, could include a gift card to a local store to get any other ingredients needed to make a recipe . that is special to them.
- Make "Blessing Boxes" for Christmas include ham, canned goods, produce, pie, etc. as well as Christmas napkins, plates, and a centerpiece. Also give a gift card to a local store to purchase gifts for the family.
- Make placemats for Meals on Wheels sewn or colored. The colored placemats will be laminated so they can be reused. https://meals-on-wheels.com/volunteer/families/other-family-volunteer-opportunities/
- . Collect food for a local food shelf. Emphasize that people donate:
 - Whole grain products (with at least 16 grams or more of whole grains per serving) 0 Food low in saturated and trans fats •
 - Food low in sodium
 - Lean sources of protein (plant and animal sources; canned or dried) 0

- Fruits that are minimally processed (canned or dried; whole, cut-up, or pureed)
- Vegetables that are minimally processed (canned or dried; whole, cut-up, or mashed)
- Dairy products or milk substitutes that are high in calcium Beverages including 100% fruit or vegetable juice
 - Basic staple foods
- Staple foods that encourage cooking and baking at home (e.g., broth, flour)
- Create Blessing Bags. These bags have a variety of non-perishable food, silverware, disposable plates, and napkins to give to people asking for money at stoplights. They also can be distributed to people who are near homeless shelters. https://www.thriftynorthwestmom.com/blessing-bag-meals/
- Decorate lunch bags for Meals on Wheel recipients. In addition to receiving the hot portion of the meal in a tray, Meals on Wheels recipients get the cold portion in a lunch bag. Add life to their meals by decorating lunch bags! Simply buy paper lunch bags and use your creativity, crayons, markers, stickers, or any art materials you have on hand
- Assemble food kits with 14 days' worth of food for people who are at high-risk and can't go to grocery stores because of COVID-19. People are identified as recipients by self-identification or through local non-profits (e.g., churches, senior centers). - Assist any local free meal program with shut-in deliveries.
- Help with Meals on Wheels and deliver meals
- Volunteer at a food shelf or pantry stock shelves, or help with the whatever is needed at the food shelf

Diabetes-

- Collect recipes then create a diabetic cookbook
- Take At-Risk Test Have group take Diabetes at Risk Test. Start a walking group - start with club members and ask community members to join you.
- Cance or kayak down a local river. Get a great workout paddling down the river (exercise to help prevent diabetes and/or keep it in check). Have a diabetes-friendly lunch and pick up any litter along the way. [Also counts as an Environment project.)
- Do a diabetes health fair with free testing for Type 2 diabetes, free services and screenings, activities, and giveaways during November (Diabetes Awareness Month). Fruit and vegetable baskets for adults - giveaway or prizes during Diabeter Awareness Month's health fair.
- Serve diabetic-friendly meals at Lions meetings and/or events during November and have a speaker talk about preventing and/or managing diabetes.
- Do a STRIDES Walk for diabetes awareness. Prior to the STRIDES Walk (and working with the local city/town), place more
- permanent benches on walking trails and along the sidewalks to encourage walking and more active lifestyles. Hold fun event raise money by doing a fun event at golf-driving field. Kids, adults, and families get a specific number of golf balls, healthy lunch, and can participate in other fun activities (bouncy houses). This crosses over into diabetes-prevention by having people of all ages being outside and active.
- Collect non-perishable food that is healthy for low-income people with diabetes (this also crosses over to be a hunge project): canned spinach, brown rice, whole-grain pasta, quinoa, millet, canned saimon, sardines, albacore (white) tuna in water, herring, no-salt kidney beans, no-salt pinto beans, no-salt black beans, walnuts, pecans, macadamia nuts, almonds,
- mandarin oranges in water, canned sweet potatoes, extra-virgin olive oil, and chia seeds. Do testing for diabetic retinopathy (which causes biindness) and test blood glucose or A1C levels. If people test positive for these problems, they will receive a referral to their doctor. The Lions also will mail them a link to get a free kit if they have Type 1 Diabetes: https://www.jdrl.org/t1d-resources/newly-diagnosed/ . For those with Type 2 Diabetes, the Lions would create their own kit that they can mail based on what's in the JDRF kits.
- Offer foot exams to test for diabetes. Diabetes can slow circulation in the feet and legs and cause people to lose feeling there. The American Diabetes Association says everyone should get an annual foot exam.
- Put donation labels in books (Donated by the _____ Lions Club with the month and year) about diabetes (Typ 2), healthy eating, and exercise/fitness that are donated to a local school and/or public libraries. (Check with lib Lions Club with the month and year) about diabetes (Type 1 and Type see what books they want to acquire.)
