## LITPC YOUTH SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION



The Lions International Trading Pin Club (LITPC) has announced for the 2024 – 2025 school year that there will be 6 US \$2,500 scholarships awarded. Graduating Leos OR graduating sons/daughters, grandsons/granddaughters of Lions are eligible to apply for the LITPC Youth Scholarship. The LITPC goal is to help our future leaders and give students a financial helping hand. This program started in 2012. Recipients have been from Connecticut (2), Delaware (2), Georgia, Iowa, Louisiana, Michigan, Minnesota (4), New York (3), Ohio (6), Oklahoma (2), Pennsylvania (3) and Virginia (6). The 2025 recipients will be announced at the LITPC Annual Meeting in 2025.

To obtain the current LITPC Youth Scholarship information:

- 1. Go to the LITPC website: www.litpc.org
- 2. In the left column, click on LITPC Scholarship Forms.
- 3. Then click on LITPC Scholarship Information.

4. When that page comes up, click on **Scholarship Application Form**. Read and follow **ALL** directions. Be sure to fill out **ALL** the forms neatly and correctly which includes the 4 essay questions (in 350 words or less) and the question about scholarships that you have been offered along with submitting a **certified** copy of your high school transcript including activities. Plus you also need to attach recommendations from 2 persons (i.e. teacher, coach, clergy, employer, etc.) **AND** attach a recommendation letter from a Lions Club member indicating the name of the Club and state/province and country in which the Club is located.

## TURN COMPLETED CHALLENGE INTO 5M3 LEADERSHIP TEAM

## Lions Gift of Sight

## (Formerly known as, Minnesota Lions Vision Foundation (MLVF)) Used Eyeglasses Collection Process

The MLVF is governed by a Board of Directors consisting of 22 Lions, 2 from each District in MD5M, except for 5M13 which is entirely in Canada. Canadian Lions have their own Eye Banks, etc. Directors serve 2 year terms with a maximum of 6 years total service. Current Directors for 5M3 are Lion James Hoyt, Wallnut Grove and the second position is open.

The Minnesota Lion's Eyeglass Recycling Center, a 501 (c) (3) non-profit organization, in Sauk Rapids, MN is an approved LCI Collection Center and is sponsored by the MLVF. It collects more than 700,000 pair of used eyeglasses every year and has collected over 9 million pairs of used eyeglasses.

The MLVF, through its Directors, provides collection boxes and identifying labels, free of charge, to local Lions Clubs. The labels provide space for the name and telephone number for a Lions Club contact person. Boxes are typically placed in Optometrist's Offices, schools, churches, funeral homes, libraries, community centers, etc. Some Clubs empty the boxes on a regular schedule, e.g. monthly, while others wait to be called. It depends on the volume of used eyeglasses and the relationship with the location.

**Eyeglass cases are not needed and should be discarded as they can triple the volume and add weight**, increasing the shipping cost to the Recycling Center. There are often brand new, never used, eyeglass cases in the collection boxes. **Clubs can check with Salvation Army and Goodwill Stores to see if they want the new cases**. I usually drop off about a dozen cases twice a year to our local Salvation Army Store. **NO LENS WITHOUT FRAMES** please.

Clubs should bring boxes of used eyeglasses to Zone & Region Meetings, the Mid-Winter Convention, or make other arrangements with their MLVF Director. The Directors transport the boxes of glasses to Board meetings where the Recycling Center volunteers pick them up. The Recycling Center will travel to the Mid-Winter Conventions to pick up the eyeglasses if the volume warrants a trip.

Any size of sturdy cardboard boxes (that can be covered) can be used for collecting the eyeglasses. It is <u>not</u> necessary to layer the glasses and put paper spacers between the eyeglasses. The eyeglasses do not get scratched or damaged in transport. The Recycling Center in Sauk Rapids receives empty apple boxes from local grocery stores and repacks as many glasses as possible in the apple boxes. These boxes are sturdy, have covers, and pack and stack well in the truck and cargo trailer used to transport the used eyeglasses to the Wisconsin Lions Foundation Center near Rosholt, WI. These boxes also stack on pallets without any wasted space.

It is not necessary to pack sunglasses separately. Non-prescription sunglasses are needed. In some countries, especially near the equator, wearing sunglasses and/or a baseball cap can prevent many eye problems. We send all sunglasses, including snap-ons, to the WI Center and they use what they can.

There is definitely a use for broken frames, frames with one lens missing, etc. The only exception is 100% plastic frames and stems—they can be discarded. Metal used in the frames often contains a minute amount of gold. Volunteers at the WI Center remove all the remaining lens and plastic from the broken frames and stems. A box, the size that holds 10 reams of paper when packed with just frame parts, may yield \$10,000 or more in gold. They work with a smelter who provides his service free and receive the full value of the reclaimed gold. This money helps reduce the expenses.

Don't bother trying to repair broken frames. Once eyeglass frames loosen up it is difficult to keep them from coming apart again. These glasses are being sent to 3<sup>rd</sup> world countries where there aren't any Drs. nor optical stores where glasses can be repaired so the WI Center ships only the glasses that have the best chance of lasting many years.

Here's what happens when the glasses reach the WI Center:

- Volunteers sort through the glasses, separating the sunglasses, broken glasses, etc.
- Glasses are cleaned and looked at for deep scratches or other issues.

• Glasses are packed into see-through stackable plastic cartons to be delivered to the local prisons.

The WI Center currently works with a federal prison and a state prison, and is considering a 3<sup>rd</sup> prison. The prisoners, under the direction of trained personnel, clean the glasses, use a machine that tells them the prescription of each lens, records those prescriptions on paper envelopes and places the glasses in the envelopes.

When the glasses are returned to the center they are sorted into 49 different prescription categories and placed in boxes ready for shipment to 3<sup>rd</sup> world countries.

i hope this answers all your questions and provides an understanding of the process for recycling used eyeglasses. It is very cost effective process with virtually all the work being done by volunteers. The people delivering the glasses to the 3<sup>rd</sup> world countries also pay their own expenses, so the total expense of a pair of Lions recycled eyeglasses is pennies. **Checks now payable to: Lions Gift of Sight**

## Training to Every Client's Needs

Learn about our DeafBlind Program and Adaptive Services

At Leader Dogs for the Blind, our top priority is ensuring each client receives customized training that allows them to develop exceptional skills to travel independently with a white cane or a guide dog. Though all our guide dog mobility instructors (GDMIs) and certified orientation and mobility specialists (COMS) are skilled at adapting the training process to accommodate a wide range of personalities and individual needs, the GDMIs on our adaptive services team also individualize client and dog

training for additional client needs or disabilities that may be physical or intellectual. Some examples of ways we are able to adapt training are:

- Train a dog to work on the right side for someone who has experienced a stroke, has a
  prosthetic hand or has lost a limb.
- Identify and train a sturdy dog for someone with an uneven gait due to cerebral palsy that can
  offer a little counterbalance and be easier to control.
- Provide one-on-one instruction at a gradual pace for someone who has experienced a traumatic brain injury.

People who are both deaf and blind can find navigating the world to be challenging. After working closely with DeafBlind clients, we began offering guide dog training in 1992 using American Sign Language (ASL) as the main method of communication. A guide dog working with a person who is DeafBlind must be extremely mature. Their training stresses partner awareness because they receive all commands from their handler via hand signals. Much attention is placed on traffic awareness and proper street crossings since these can be extreme safety issues for people who are DeafBlind.

## Appendix 28.0 MD5M HALL OF FAME Procedure

#### Purpose

To honor those Lion members of character and substance who have demonstrated the highest level of commitment and dedication to the efforts of their club, district or multiple district and the motto of our association, "We Serve."

#### Award

There shall be a maximum of one (1) recipient of the MD5M Hall of Fame Award per district, inducted into the MD5M Hall of Fame each year. The award may be presented posthumously.

The MD5M Hall of Fame award recipients are to be inducted into the Hall of Fame at the annual MD5M Multiple District Convention during the Saturday noon luncheon.

MD5M Hall of Fame recipients shall receive a MD5M Hall of Fame award plaque and a Hall of Fame lapel pin in recognition of their induction in the MD5M Hall of Fame. In addition, a complete listing of all MD5M Hall of Fame recipients shall appear in the annual MD5M directory and a perpetual plaque, with the names of all inductees and the year of their induction inscribed thereon, shall be kept in a prominent place in the MD5M office, when available.

The presentation of the MD5M Hall of Fame inductees shall be the responsibility of the current International Director from MD5M, if there is one and they are in attendance at the MD5M Multiple District Convention. If not, then the most recent Past International Director having served from MD5M in attendance at the MD5M Multiple District Convention.

## Criteria

A candidate may be a Lion, must have been a member in good standing for at least 15 years, be at least two (2) years removed from the Council of Governors if a PDG, should have qualifications above and beyond the call of duty including social and human endeavors, and they should be of good moral character and have a good reputation in his/her community. A nominee must be a member in good standing of a Lions Club, or must have been a member in good standing of a Lions Club at the time of their death.

#### Process

A candidate may be sponsored by any Lion, Lions Club, Zone, or District.

There shall be a nomination fee of \$150.00 per each candidate nominated. The nomination fee shall be returned to those sponsors whose candidates are not elected for induction into the MD5M Hall of Fame. The nomination fee for those selected for induction shall be sent to MD5M and shall be used to offset the cost of the award process, plaques and pin.

Nominations, including the nomination fee, must be received by the District Governor at least 30 days prior to the District's Midwinter Convention.

Each individual District shall annually hold an election at their Midwinter Convention to determine the candidate(s), if any, to be inducted into the Hall of Fame for that Lion Year. Each sponsor shall have an opportunity to give a brief presentation on the merits and biographical information of their nominee prior to the election. Those elected to be inducted into the MD5M Hall of Fame shall not be publicly announced until their induction at the MD5M Multiple District Convention.

All nominations shall use the standard form, no others shall be accepted. The nomination fee must be received at the time the application is received, otherwise the nomination shall not be considered.

All successful candidates shall be inducted into the MD5M Hall of Fame at the next MD5M Multiple District Convention. The sponsor(s) and the respective District Governor shall ensure that the honoree or a suitable representative shall be in attendance at the MD5M Multiple District Convention Saturday Luncheon when the honorees are inducted.

A brief biography of each inductee shall be announced to those in attendance during the induction ceremony at the annual MD5M Multiple District Convention.
