Would like to thank PDG Don Kuehl for doing a wonderful job as the District Governor for 5M3. Don went above and beyond to help the Lions of 5M3 for a very great and enjoyable year. Thanks again for all your help and answering questions.

The International Convention that was to be held in Singapore in late June didn't happen. I took the Oath for being DG online by LCI President, Dr. Jung-Yul Choi. He is from South Korea and is 76 years old. Dr. Choi is a driven leader and will be doing many great things for the LIONS. Different way to take the Oath for District Governor, DG Don and some of the members from Sherburn Lions to witnessed the ceremony.

My theme for the year is BRINGING GROWTH TO LIONS. Membership is falling hard in 5M3. As of July 1, we are at 1113 members. The 5M3 Global Action Team is having meetings with Pat Vannett, Area Leader for NAMI. They're working with Team leaders to come up with a plan on how to deal with low membership in 5M3. One of the things that stands out is to have good communication between the Members, Zone Chairs, and District Governor. We hope to find out what works for the clubs and what doesn't. Stay tuned for more details.

District Governor Goals for 2020-2021

- 1. 50% club officers at officers training. 35 members and 18 clubs participated 2019-2020.
- 2. At least 5 members from 5M3 attend LCI Sponsored Leaders Institutes training.
- 3. Net Gain of 30 members in 5M3 for 2020-2021
- 4. 3 Membership Growth Events
- 5. 5M3 to serve 35000 people in 2020-2021. 28,654 people were served in 2019-2020.
- 6. 5M3 to complete 300 service activities 2020-2021. 2019-2020 had 280 service activities.
- 7. 40% of 5M3 membership will contribute to LCIF.
- 8. 100% Club Contribution to LCIF
- 9. 50% of Lions Clubs reporting service activities to LCI.

LCIF is the Lions Foundation that provides grants and support to people in need. The CAMPAIGAN 100 program has been extended to June 30, 2022. The total goal is 100 million per year and the total so far is 154.3 million. It's good, but we can do better.

Northern Pride Lions Forum has been cancelled and will tentatively happen in March 2022. At this time there are many leadership opportunities taking place. When more things start happening details will be coming out.

Lions Clubs are starting to meet again and doing projects that have been on hold. I am ready to do club visits. Some clubs have contacted me and set up visits beginning in August. Let me know when you are ready.

NAMI 5M3

Greetings Lions of 5M3. I thought I would be done writing articles for the newsletter after becoming a "PDG", but I accepted a new challenge and here I am again. Hopefully, you will not get tired of reading what I have to say!!!! How many of you have heard of or know what NAMI is? It is short for North America Membership Initiative. Membership, we all have heard of that. Our District needs to grow, replace our aging (yes, I am in this category too) members and those who have moved away, or unfortunately have passed. So, this initiative (or plan) is meant to be Club focused and driven. We want to work with all the Clubs in 5M3 to develop service projects and increase membership over the next three years. It will be a challenge as our District has lost members over the past five years or longer. As of the end of June 2020, our District membership was 1113, the lowest we have ever been. We need to reverse this trend and the District Leadership elected to participate in the NAMI program.

What are the goals for NAMI in 5M3? First, a positive membership growth in 5M3 for 2020/2021. DG Dave's goal is that we will have a net GAIN of 30 members for this year. Remember, that is after backdoor losses, deaths and members moving out of our district. So, for your Club to have a net gain, if you lose 2 members you need to gain 3. Second, but still equally important, is to organize and start a new club or clubs in 5M3. That is also something we have not done for a while. DG Dave has a goal of starting at least one new club this year. If you think you know of a community that would welcome a new club please let me know. Third, we need to help revitalize our Clubs that have less than 10 members. Our NAMI team will work with you to increase your membership and strengthen your club. The last goal of NAMI is to support new Club service projects. Guess what folks, we cannot continue to be a "check writing" club and provide no service to our communities. We need to do those service projects in the community and let the community know what we are doing. Invite people in the community to help us, then ask them to join. People want to help with community projects not just do fund raising (don't get me wrong, that is important for our communities and what we do too)

How are we going to do this? We will start with asking each Club in our District to support this initiative. A letter will be sent to all Clubs presidents asking them to talk to their clubs about NAMI in 5M3. This is important, we need buy in from all club members for this to work. OK, enough for now. You will be hearing more each month in the newsletter on how we are doing. Can-D0-Canines



The pandemic has taken it's toll on CDC also. As the virus got worse we had to take our dogs out of the prisons. We had to find homes for our dogs but thankfuly enough volunteers stepped forward and gave them homes where they could stay. We now have been able to take dogs back to Stanley and Jackson, WI, which has taken some of the pressure off and has made the inmates happy once again. Soon we should have the prison program up and running again which will mean the 82 of our dogs will be back in training. We held our first virtual graduation on Sat. June 27 honoring 13 new graduates. You can watch a 22 minute Video of the graduation ceremomy by going to our website <u>can-do-canines.org</u>. We will do a virtual fundraiser (which is one of our bigger fundraisers) on Saturday Sept. 12th. If you are interested please sign up soon.

We did virtual training on the 18th of July and I have received the info I need for this. If you want me to come to your club I can, or set it up as a virtual meeting. will close this months article with a story on of our recipiants:

It takes a very special dog to see someone who is upset and calmly enter their space of distress to comfort them. Children with autism, like Jackson, need these dogs to help them handle the overabundance of stimulation that surrounds them. In 2014, Jackson was diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder after his parents and doctors became concerned that he wasn't exhibiting the same behaviors as other toddlers. As he spent more time in social settings, it became apparent he would require specialized support to keep him safe and happy. Jackson would often run away from people or act impulsively, not realizing the potential dangers of this. He would frequently become overwhelmed without being able to express what he was experiencing or needed. Jackson's parents worked ceaselessly to get their son the tools he needed, hoping he would be able to manage the amount of stimulation around him and regulate the things that caused him stress. Even with a barrage of coping resources and a constant flow of therapies and healthcare providers, Jackson would still become overwhelmed and have outbursts or run. His parents reached out to Can Do Canines with a call for help and an application for a service dog. After being accepted, Jackson met his new therapist in the form of a large, lovable Labrador Retriever named Zing. Zing, who was also our recent front-desk ambassador, has spent his two years of life as a calming presence, cuddling as much as possible with people who helped raise him. This made him an ideal match for Jackson. Before Zing, Jackson would isolate himself in his own guiet world, though he craved friendships. Zing has since helped him manage more social situations than was possible before. Having Zing with him gives Jackson an icebreaker and the confidence during hard interactions. When Jackson becomes agitated, Zing applies pressure therapy by leaning against Jackson. That familiar sensation helps Jackson relax. Also, Jackson wears a belted tether and holds a handle that is connected to Zing's special cape. When they are walking in public, Jackson's urge to run or wander is stopped by Zing anchoring himself in response. This keeps Jackson safe and gives his parents time to react. Checking the handle, along with other caregiving tasks, gives Jackson something to focus on, a responsibility to fulfill. And an incredible bonus is the accomplishment Jackson feels by teaching Zing new things. As his mother shares, "When Jackson starts feeling agitated or overwhelmed, he sits on the floor and opens his arms and says 'Zing hug.' Zing immediately walks over to Jackson and lets Jackson hug him." The whole family is amazed by the difference Zing has made already, and they are ecstatic at the possibility of doing more together. Jackson's brother watched Zing interrupt a meltdown by resting his head on his lap, then told their mother, "That dog is amazing." She emphatically says to everyone involved with Zing's upbringing, "Thank you so much for taking the time to make Zing the amazing dog he is . . . We feel safe in the Can Do Canines family as the organization takes a non-judgmental approach to Jackson and his diagnosis. You all are angels sent to our family and we promise to take the best care of Zing."
