- We're taking the functionality of our current digital tools and creating one streamlined experience.
- The new portal is built on Salesforce, an industry-leading platform used by over 150,000 organizations including 40,000 nonprofits.
- MyLion, MyLCI and Insights, along with some additional tools and functionality will be accessible through an updated portal for members.
- The portal will have all the same features and functionality currently available with separate tools, but with a more consistent and efficient experience — whether you're on your computer, your tablet or mobile device.
- We're aiming to launch in mid-2023. And a preview of the portal will be available before that. Stay tuned for more information.

Update your Lion Account information

Make sure your Lion Account information is correct and up to date in MyLCI or your regional reporting system. Note that the new Lion Portal will require a unique, unshared email, and phone numbers will no longer be supported as a log in credential.

If you're a club president, secretary or administrator, updating member information is simple:

- · Log in to the current member portal with your Lion Account credentials
- Navigate to MyLCI
- · Select "My Lions Club"
- Select "Members"
- Click on the member whose information you need to update.
- · Select "Edit Member" to enter in their revised email address and other updated information.

"Achieve New Heights"

Greetings Lions of 5M3. Finally warmer weather has returned giving us hope for the winter weather to be gone, although the late snows keep reminding us of winter. To our farm members just a word of caution, be careful in the fields this spring and I hope you all have a good spring planting season, that goes for you gardeners too.

What's happening in District 5M3? Let's start with where we are at with membership. As of the end of March, membership stood at 1026, with a net loss of 9 members year to date. We still have time to reverse the trend and end with a positive number. Please continue to ask others to join us in serving our communities. Our goal for membership was to end the year with a positive number. We are not too far from this and with your help (and our clubs) we can achieve this. On a more positive note, over 77% of our clubs have or are reporting their service to LCI. If my math is correct that's 27 clubs out of 35. We as a District have served over 59,000 people in our communities. That's an amazing number. Just think what the number would be if every club was reporting. Our goal as a district was to have 50% of clubs reporting and we've achieved that. A huge shout out to our GST PDG Dave Janssen for his efforts. I know he has called several clubs and encouraged their participation.

DGE Patty is working on getting her District Cabinet and Zone Chairs selected. My encouragement to you, if asked, please accept and help. She will do an amazing job, but she can't do it alone. I know it's easy to sit on your hands and not volunteer, but it isn't that hard, and you may enjoy it. Which brings me to my last item for the district. The Second Vice District Governor position is still open. We need someone to step up. Club Presidents, you need to identify potential leaders in your clubs. Encourage them to attend our leadership programs. We need these people to carry on the leadership roles for our District. Probably the most disappointing thing to me as District Governor of 5M3 is the lack of people willing to commit to leading our District going forward. Have some faith and volunteer to be a leader for our District.

What's happening at the Multiple District level? When you are reading this, we will be getting ready to gather for the MD5M convention in St. Cloud. At the Council of Governor's meeting on Friday morning, we will be discussing and hopefully passing, a new privacy policy for MD5M. If that happens it will go into effect on July 1st, 2023. If any Lion in MD5M wishes to "opt out" and not have his information listed (phone number, email, address) they need to sign an "opt out" form and return it to their club president by June 30th, 2023. This will be a short fuse, so club presidents take heed and help your members with this if asked. If you get any "opt out" forms, the club presidents are to forward them to the MD5M executive secretary, Lion Cindy Walters. Any questions regarding this please give me a call or email.

Ok, once again I'm probably forgetting something, but it will have to wait till next time. Continue to serve your communities and have a safe spring.

Lions Screen Children's Eyes

The Lions Club of New Ulm screened the eyes of 56 children at the New Ulm Home and Health Show on March 31st and April



1st. Thirty One were age 4 or younger. Six Children were found to be in need of a follow-up exam by an eye-care professional. Lions KidSight Foundation is part of a national coalition that screens preschool and school age kids. The screenings are done at no cost by local Lions Clubs.
