The university of Minnesota will host the annual Special Olympics Minnesota Summer Games! Roughly 3,000 athletes will be competing in basketball, basketball, swimming, and gymnastics throughout the weekend. Outside of competition, there will be entertainment in the athlete Village, health screenings for athletes, Celebration Ceremonies, and many other activities for everyone! Summer Games is open to the public and family friendly!

The Lions have played a major part in this competition for many years, and will once again host the Opening Eyes screening. As part of the Healthy Athletes program offerings, Opening Eyes provides a complete eye exam, conducted by eye doctors and eye care professionals. During the Opening Eyes screening, Athletes have the opportunity to receive new eye glasses, sunglasses or sports goggles, free of charge! Opening Eyes is presented by Lions Club International.

Opening Eyes in Minnesota was first undertaken by Lions Clubs of 5M5, but we need you to make this screening happen! Opening Eyes volunteers directly impact the health of SOMN Athletes! Volunteers will also have the opportunity to meet and interact with Special Olympics Minnesota Athletes, and also meet Lions from other clubs and other districts. Volunteers will receive a Summer Games Volunteer t-shirt and Volunteers working over six hours will also receive a complimentary lunch.

The review board will meet in April, decide which grants are to be given to which clubs and then, the whole board of directors will vote on the recommended grants from the committee. Below is more information on the T.E.A.M. Sheehan Foundation:

The T.E.A.M. Sheehan Charitable Foundation is a nonprofit organization dedicated to empowering Lions Clubs within Multiple District 5M (MD5M) to enhance their community service initiatives. Established in Minnesota on March 17, 2022, the foundation received its 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status on June 23, 2022.

#### **Mission and Objectives**

The foundation's mission is to support MD5M Lions Clubs by providing matching grants for community projects. These grants are designed to assist clubs in undertaking projects that may be too large for their individual budgets but are not eligible for larger Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) grants. By offering matching funds, the foundation aims to fill the funding gap for smaller-scale projects, thereby enabling clubs to serve their communities more effectively.

#### **Board of Directors**

The foundation is governed by a Board of Directors comprising 15 members, each representing one of the MD6M districts. The Executive Committee includes:

- Mike Molenda, Chairperson (District 5M6)
- Bruce Beck, Vice-Chairperson (District 5M9)
- Joan Blank, Secretary (District 5M2)
- Marty Athmann, Treasurer (District 5M4)
- Brian & Lori Sheehan, Advisory Members (District 5M4)

The foundation's leadership reflects a diverse representation from across the MDSM districts, ensuring a broad perspective in decision-making processes.

#### **Grant Program**

The foundation offers matching 50/50 fund grants, initially up to \$3,000, to support Lions Clubs in their community projects. These grants are intended to assist clubs in undertaking projects that may be too large for their individual budgets but are not eligible for larger LCIF grants. By providing matching funds, the foundation aims to fill the funding gap for smaller-scale projects, thereby enabling clubs to serve their communities more effectively.

#### **Recent Developments**

In August 2024, the foundation awarded its first two matching grants during a board meeting held on August 27. This milestone marks the foundation's active role in supporting Lions Clubs' community service efforts.

Connection to the Sheehan Lion Brian E, Sheehan, who served as the Immediate Past International President of Lions Clubs International and is the current LCIF Chairperson. Lion Brian and his wife, Lori, have been instrumental in the foundation's establishment and ongoing initiatives.
