Tax receipts will be issued for all donations of \$20.00 or more. Donations clearly marked as **Philippine Disaster Relief** are also eligible for Melvin Jones Fellowships. Kindly share this information with Lions in your Club.

I have also been asked two questions in respect to Philippines Disaster Relief.

1. Is the Lions of Canada Fund for LCIF a recognized charity eligible for the matching funds from the Canadian Government?

The Lions of Canada Fund for LCIF is a registered charity, which is eligible to receive funds, donated to the Philippine Disaster Relief efforts. Cheques must be made payable to the following: Lions of Canada Fund for LCIF

And mailed to:

Lions of Canada Fund for LCIF Barrhaven RO P.O. Box 89059 Nepean, Ontario K2S 0R2

Cheques must be clearly marked as <u>Philippine Disaster Relief</u> and must be received no later December 9th to be eligible for the Canadian Government matching funds.

2. Is the Lions of Canada Fund for LCIF only for Lions members' donations or can anyone make a donation?

The Lions of Canada Fund for LCIF is a registered charity to which anyone can donate money. Official Tax Receipts will be issued for amounts of \$20.00 or greater. It should be noted that every penny, which is donated, goes to the charity. Absolutely no funds are used for administration fees.

Lets Dream about Membership



Does your Lions Club have an elected 3 person 'Membership Committee'? Does the Board of Directors review that committee and its achievements regularly?

The Membership Committee's main focus, main objective, main purpose is to seek out prospective new members. Right? Well that is not everything.

What else does it do?

Since 1989 when the 3-person format was implemented by Lions International, the committee was challenged with four important responsibilities, They were asked to be the lead in reinforcing the importance of membership to the club and the importance of individual members responsibilities.

They are to have an open and ongoing dialogue about membership issues with the club's board of directors.

Also they are to provide a direct link to the district and multiple district MERL teams.

More importantly they are to engage with all members to help them stay active and involved.

This model with it's 3 member - 3 year term has be been heralded with creating stronger, healthier Lions Clubs when fully implemented as designed.

Then in 2002 LCI, after careful review, and in an effort to give a more defined role for each member changed the responsibilities to help focus each committee member's activities. This helped them use their time more effectively to cover all aspects of Membership.

The changes helped defined each member's responsibilities as described below.

The newly elected member with three years to go (referred to as the Freshman) would be the member responsible for MEMBERSHIP that is they will:

Create achievable goals and develop an action plan on how to get new members. He/she will encourage members to set their own goals on how to ask new people to join our clubs.

They will co-ordinate workshops on membership.



They are the Liaison with the board of directors initiating communication. And, lastly they will seek out the counsel of the pervious chair, to ascertain that goals and commitments of previous committees have a continuum.

The junior member, with two years remaining in their mandate is to focus on LEADERSHIP and RETENTION. This member also serves as the vice chairperson of the committee. Responsibilities include:

- Set leadership and retention goals and develop an action plan for each
- Organize and promote annual officer club training
- Work with the district leadership chairperson to conduct annual club officer training
- Coordinate and conduct club workshops on leadership and retention
- Assist club committee chairperson in developing their own workshops, seminars, conferences, and other meetings
- Prepare articles on leadership and retention for club and district publications
- Involve previous club leadership chairperson in developing leadership

The (Chairperson) member with one year left concentrates on extension. This

Member is also the chairperson of the committee and serves on the club's board of directors.

Their primary focus should be, but not limited too the following: Look for new opportunities to start new clubs.

Create a set of goals and write an action plan for the extension committee. Start a sub-committee that focuses on extension.

Organize and oversee a group of extension minded Lions interested in chartering new clubs.

Keep the Board of Directors informed and up to date regarding extension opportunities.

Prepare articles on extension for club and district publications Attend district and multiple district extension workshops

There you have it A Three Person Membership Committee. The Workload is an indication that this is not a position for junior Lions. It is for the well-informed and active members with above average communications skills and a commitment to Lions Clubs. It is also important that they enjoy credibility with the Lions and can work cooperatively with the membership. Electing the wrong members with all the good intentions will not guarantee success.

So you say, "We are only a ten or eleven member Lions Club, how in heck are we suppose to find three member to sit for three years on this committee?"

The answer is in your question.

You are only a 10 or 11 member club because you don't have a membership committee!
