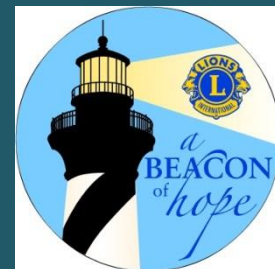

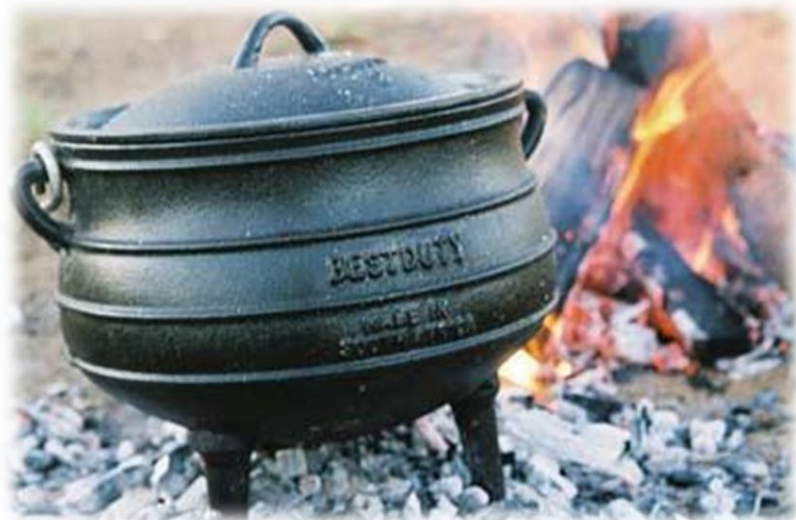

- Donate plates and clothes to Zororo Village floods victims.

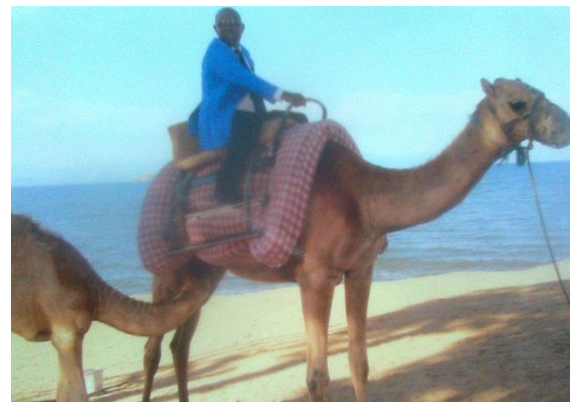

"It was the first occasion on which the political, social and economic problems of the global environment were discussed at an intergovernmental forum

with a view to actually taking corrective action." World Environment Day is similar to Earth Day.
