18 girls and 15 boys attended a leadership course at Outward Bound, Chimanimani from the 21^{st} to 27^{th} of February.

The 33 students did the team-building course in 3 groups namely Bundi, Chinokwe and Haroni. All these being rivers that flow through scenic Chimanimani.

Apart from learning about the history of Outward Bound and expressing their hopes and fears, the groups had to set themselves their own course objectives. Their activities which started with a daily 0530hrs jog and dip in Tessa's Pool included obstacles such as Jacob's son's ladder, Pamper pole and a Haroni Gorge walk. Rock climbing, zip-wire, raft-building, navigation skills and orienteering were also part of the activities.

Day 5 saw the 3 groups departing for a mountain expedition at 0530hrs. They later ascended Mount Nyangoma before camping and spending the night in the mountains.

It was an awesome experience for the group despite some grazes, bruises and tears.

<u>Making a difference through</u> <u>social media</u>



Social media has covered some fascinating ground. From its inception and almost supernatural ability to connect long lost friends, colleagues and lovers, to giving people the chance to share everything from their nail polish preferences to their bowel movements, social media has infiltrated each and every corner of our daily lives. But it's not all about bored narcissists sitting at their PC's that make up this virtual universe. Thanks to **#TBDZA (Twitter-driven blanket drive)**, this powerful medium has been used to achieve massive charitable goals in South Africa, and looks to grow even more this year.

It all began three years ago when founder Melanie Minnaar tweeted about her wish to collect blankets for the unfortunate souls on the cold streets. This simple idea gathered momentum at an astonishing rate, on Twitter, and things began to take shape.

In 2010, the collective South African Twitter community managed to pull together 8 different, nationwide events and collect over 500 blankets and a few cash donations. In 2011,

the initiative had mushroomed

to include 11 national events, the collection of over 4000

blankets and more than R30 000 in charitable donations! In

2012, even greater success is anticipated.

For the first time, #TBDZA has spread beyond SA borders and into Zimbabwe. Lions club of Triangle have started their own Blanket Drive in the Lowveld and hope to be successful in

We have four guardian mothers and each of them takes care of 10 children. Each house mother is responsible for the children in her house. The house mothers are involved in everything the children do and they give advice and teach the children their chores. They are to



treat the children with love yet teach them discipline and rules. The children learn to respect and love their house mothers. At Lirhanzo Children's Village the daily

activities start at 6 o'clock in the morning when the children wake up. Their first chore for the day is to sweep the yard (area around the houses) with grass brooms. After sweeping the yard they clean their bedrooms, bath and make their beds. The bigger children will help the younger ones to make their beds. During school the mothers will cook the breakfast, but in the holidays the girls help prepare sour porridge (soft maize meal with lemon) for all at 7 am while the boys are working in the garden. The guardian mothers will be supervising all the children while they are performing their chores. By letting the boys do the same chores as the girls, they are learning to take care of themselves for one day when they are working and living alone. After porridge the children will be in school at Lirhanzo Mission School and the smaller ones will be playing in the play area while the mothers are busy with their tasks.

Tea break starts at 10 am and the Lirhanzo children will run from school, which is only 200m away, to join the smaller children for tea and bread. Then they run back to school. The babies and smaller children will sometimes take a morning sleep. At 12 noon the mothers start to prepare lunch for the children. The children will break from school at 1 pm and eat their lunch. All the children at Lirhanzo have their responsible duties, so the person on duty for the day will then wash the dishes after lunch. Children will also spend their break time playing and talking with their friends.

After lunch the children will go back to school for homework and sports activities. In the first term (January –April) they will be practicing athletics, in the second term

(May – August)they will be playing ball games like soccer and netball, and the last term (September -December) they will be singing choir competitions and drama. One of the activities at school is agriculture. During that activity the children will work in the joint vegetable garden, they will carry water to water the plants in buckets on their heads and do weeding. School ends at 4 pm and then they will go home to Lirhanzo to perform their chores for those who are on duty. During the holidays, children will be playing, some will be reading and some will be resting in their rooms during the afternoons. At 3:30 the boys will collect the donkeys and put them in front of the donkey cart to go and collect firewood for cooking. The girls will help to start prepare supper. If they cooked rice for lunch, then they will be cooking sadza (maize meal in a stiff form) for supper or they will eat sadza for lunch and supper with either green vegetables as a side dish or protein like small dried fish (Kapenta), meat, sugar beans or soya with a sauce. Supper will be dished up between 6 and 7 pm. After supper and cleaning up, the children and mothers

will meet in the central thatched kitchen for the evening prayer. During this time they will be singing gospel songs and dance. Each child is given a chance to pray for the whole village and for him/herself.

During weekends, the children who are able to do their own washing, do that and iron their own uniforms and clothes. On Sundays they all go to church by donkey cart, which is about three kilometers from the Home. All children and mothers from Lirhanzo attend the same Church which is the Alliance Church in Zimbabwe. We try to give the children of Lirhanzo a chance to experience a normal life where they can experience and learn about everyday life, discipline, respect and love. We want them to be balanced individuals that can look after themselves when they leave the Home.

Charítíes & Projects

July 2012 - Apríl 2013

With your support we managed to carry out the following activities and projects;

- A very successful trip to Mutikizizi Old People's Home took place on15 September 2012. We took donations of food, clothing, sugar, coffee mugs, plastic cups and plates filling three trucks. We also had a braai with the aged people and they applauded the visit.
- We paid hospital bills for two Senior Citizens and one destitute case.
- We paid hospital bills for one destitute case. USD 817.00
- We paid Parerenyatwa Orthopaedic Centre for prosthesis for a child. USD 445.00
- US\$750 was donated to a member of our community who is scheduled to undergo an operation soon.
- Poitjie Cooking Competition was held in July 2012 and raised \$481.00
- Pub Night was held in July playing "60's" music and members dressed in "60's" attire.
- Soccer gala held on 25th August raised \$957.00. This was launched in 2009 as an Annual Event and has raised a total of \$2830.00 since its inception.
- Donated 50 cups and 50 plates to Lions Club of Chiredzi.
- Donated 500 cups and 500 plates to two orphanages in the Bulawayo area.
- Donated one wheel chair to one disabled lady.
- A wheelchair and bath chair was donated to one of the elderly citizens in our community.
- Donated crutches to 3 beneficiaries.
- Donated walking frame to one beneficiary.
- US\$180 was raised through the sale of scrap polyweave bags and plastic cups, plates, etc.

- Scrap Polyweave Bags continue to raise funds for the Club. The latest consignment should raise USD 2400.00
- We managed to make our annual trip to Lirhanzo Children's Home in Chikombedzi. We got the children from Murray MacDougall Primary School involved by asking them to donate clothes and toys to the orphanage. We went with two truckloads of clothes and toys we still continue to collect clothes through the school.
- Donated the clothes to the Zororo Village (Mufakose, Triangle) flood victims. Although these clothes had been meant for Orphanages in the Lowveld, we felt the plight of the victims was direr and needed immediate attention. We intend to identify individual needs of the flood victims that the club can help with.
- The Mega Mud Fest and Cane Rally took place on 24 February 2013. The US\$217 raised from this event went into the club's charity account.
- A successful outward bound course was conducted in Chimanimani for a group of 33 grade 7 pupils from Murray MacDougall School.

LCI – Our History

1917: The Beginning Chicago business leader

Melvin Jones asked a simple and world-changing question – what if people put their talents to work improving their communities? Almost 100 years later, Lions

Clubs International is the world's largest service club organization, with more than 1.3 million members in more than 45,000 clubs and countless stories of Lions acting on the same simple idea: let's improve our communities.

1920: Going International Just three years after our founding, Lions became international when we established the first club in Canada. Mexico followed in 1927. In the 1950s and 1960s international growth accelerated, with new clubs in Europe, Asia and Africa.

1925: Eradicating Blindness Helen Keller addressed the Lions Clubs International Convention in Cedar Point, Ohio, USA, and challenged Lions to become "knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness." Since then, we have worked tirelessly to aid the blind and visually impaired.

1945: Uniting Nations The ideal of an international organization is exemplified by our enduring relationship with the United Nations. We were one of the first nongovernmental organizations invited to assist in the drafting of the United Nations Charter and have supported the work of the UN ever since.

1957: Organizing Youth Programs In the

late 1950s, we created the Leo Program to provide the youth of the world with an opportunity for personal development through volunteering. There are approximately 144,000 Leos and 5,700 Leo clubs in more than 140 countries worldwide.

1968: Establishing Our Foundation Lions

Clubs International Foundation assists Lions with global and large-scale local humanitarian projects. Through our Foundation, Lions meet the needs of their local

and global communities.

1990: Launching SightFirst Through

SightFirst, Lions are restoring sight and preventing blindness

on a global scale. Launched in 1990, Lions have raised more than \$346 million for this initiative. SightFirst targets the major causes of blindness: cataract, trachoma, river blindness, childhood blindness, diabetic retinopathy and glaucoma.

Today: Extending Our Reach Lions Clubs

International extends our mission of service every day – in local communities, in all corners of the globe. The needs are great and our services broad, including sight, health, youth, elderly, the environment and disaster relief. Our international network has grown to include more than 200 countries and geographic areas.
