Much of Gary's time these days is spent in the garden and he enjoys woodworking. He supports his family and always willing to give a helping hand to neighbours and friends.

In 1984 he joined the Tsawwassen Boundary Bay Lions Club and he has held numerous positions with the club. Gary enjoys Lions and its commitment to service and to giving back to the community.
