#### READING ACTION PROGRAM: A LIFE CHANGER

#### THE STORY OF DIKE

(A RAPing tale: From the recollections of an older gentlemen)

On a foggy, cold night on Upper New York Bay, the quiet, eerie air is shattered by the blaring of a ship's brass horn turned green by the ocean air. The ship's "green horn" signals the ship is approaching the dock and will soon be unloading its cargo on an island in early 1900s. The restive island suddenly becomes a beehive of activity and the lights in the building shine as beacons as the ship inches closer to the docks. Men in green and brown uniforms race to desks with piles of books and papers tossed about. At the dock, hundreds of people disembark, some with only the clothes on their backs, some with crying children, all huddling and clinging to each other, all with the unmistakable marks of a long journey from an old world to new world. The immigrants are processed by the men in brown and green and sent on their way to a new life, in a new place. Years later, the paths of two families who huddled together in nervous anticipation will cross again

One family finds themselves on the craggy shores of Southeastern, Massachusetts and the other in small town on the windswept shores of Narragansett Bay. Families came there to find work in the Mills. For the children, there is no time for school, as soon as they became "of age", they worked in the Mills, as did their parents; for so many hours, for so very little pay. After all, these are "Green Horns" in a new and bewildering country with a different language and different customs. They survived and did the best they could. The two families lived "miles" apart yet, somehow, two members of those families spanned the miles and time to meet and marry: and thus begins the story of "Dike".

"Dike", they said, was a problem child right from the beginning and few ever thought he would make anything of himself. He, of all things, repeated Kindergarten for being "immature", and when passed into first grade, he promptly repeated that grade, for being a "day dreamer." He, they said, had no desire to read or study or care about anything: he was just a problem child. As time went on, he became more belligerent, more rebellious, more of a problem in school, at home, and just about anywhere. He repeated the fourth grade and in the fifth grade he began to "con" his Mom into believing it was the teachers, not he, who were the problem. He changed the marks on his papers knowing that his Mom had no clue about the 40s turned into 90s; the 60s turn into 80s. He was placed into a "special class" for problem kids and this made his rambunctious and destructive behavior worse. It got so bad; they sent him back to regular classrooms.

Education, Education, High School Diploma" his mother preached, "was the way to a better life." But she could not help Dike with his homework, she never made out of the sixth grade and his Dad was the same. His older sibling tried to help, but to no avail; they had their homework and after school jobs and time was not on their side; to make ends meet, everyone had a job.

The downward spiral into the black hole of helplessness continued. Dike become increasingly destructive and began intimating other students. He didn't want to be this way, he really didn't, but it was the only way he knew how to survive the barbs of being stupid and dumb and the son of "Green Horns". He once made a beautiful mother's day card and signed it hoping his Mom would really like it. But the funny signature looking like "dike" brought laugher and taunts from his family.

Junior high school officials and teachers wanted to get rid of him, get him out of their hair somehow, someway. A teacher suggested sending him into an Industrial Arts (IA) program at High School just a short few blocks away, but far enough to get rid of him. He would enter the ninth grade as "one of those" that could not make it in a regular 9<sup>th</sup> grade and so off to "IA" he went.

But something funny, unbelievable, and even incredible happened on the way to that new school, only a short few blocks away. Something, that for many years, "Dike", could not understand. He suddenly was transformed into a model student, gone was the destructive behavior and rumpled clothes; in place now were hand-me-down suit jackets and nicely creased pants. The dumb son of green horns made the honor roll getting "A's" in reading, writing and math. He transferred to the college preparatory course of study in the tenth grade and made it through with little difficulty.

On a bright and beautiful day in June, in a small town on the sun drenched shores of Narragansett Bay, "Dike" walked across the stage to pick up a prize. As he walked he could hear the words "Education, Education, Education, a high school diploma was the way to a better life". Somehow, a son that might otherwise have followed a life of desperation, of crime and who knows what else, came to the stage and collected that all important High School Diploma. His Mom, who stood by him and loved him no matter what, beamed with pride. Along with the prize was the realization he was no longer stupid and dumb and he was proud to be the son of Green Horns. He moved on and got his bachelor and two Masters Degrees.

What happened on the journey to High School remains a mystery to "Dike"; that summer is locked in the darkness of his mind. He never spoke of it with his parents or his siblings. It didn't matter how it happened, it matter that it did happen and whatever it was, so profoundly changed his life.

Suddenly, after many years, the answer came. His brother sent him a "milestone" birthday card with cute images of the past; the baseball bat and glove bringing back memories of the fun they had playing ball on the common. And then he saw it – "Dike". He stared at it in wonderment; and kept looking harder and harder. The lights in his mind became beacons and the letters jumped out to him. The signature on that mother's day card he wanted his Mom to love so many years ago, wasn't "Dike', it was "Dike".

Someone, somewhere, somehow discovered that Dike wasn't stupid or dumb, he was <u>Dyslectic</u>. "Dike" does not remember who that someone was who helped him overcome this problem. But it must be someone with the ability to help the functionally illiterate, like Dike, read and to help identify and overcome problems.

To this day "Dike" still has problems reading. He must concentrate on every word shutting out all other senses. He can't read the streaming ribbon on the bottom of the TV and hear the audio. He still has problems pronouncing words and names and transposes numbers. Sometimes people laugh at him for the mispronunciations. But he is thankful, to whom he does not know, but that someone took the time to change the life of a child.

I am Dike, District Governor Dick Silveira of 25 A. I hope this story will make all Lions realize the importance of International President Maddens' Reading Action Program. All of us have the ability to be a life changer. IP Wayne Madden's LCI Reading Action Program is all it might take. I encourage every Lion, in every club to institute a Reading Action program in every community. Will you take the time to save a child or an adult, from a life of desperation?

#### Will you be the nest "life changer"?

This is a true story based on the recollections of older Lion. I got lucky. I hope we can change that luck into programs that gives every child and every adult the opportunities to succeed. Please support IP Wayne Madden and LCI's literacy programs and start RAPing.

### Message from President Madden

Dear Lions,

Throughout the year I've drawn analogies to sports in my speeches and messages. Consider this – many baseball games are won with 2 outs in the 9<sup>th</sup> inning, there have been a number of World Cup soccer matches decided in extra time, and yes – many auto races are decided during the last lap of the race.

We are quickly approaching the end of the year, our "last lap" of the race. By now you have held all of your pit stops, you have hopefully done your community needs assessments, participated in the Reading Action Program and Global Service Action Campaigns, attended or soon will attend your district and multiple district conventions, and completed your qualifications for the Club Excellence Award or District Governor Team Excellence Award. In short, you have completed the necessary steps that should ensure a successful year.

But if history is an indication, we know that much can happen in the last two months of the year. June is particularly significant with regard to adding new members and new clubs as well as keeping members. Here is the reason:

23% of new clubs are chartered in May/June - 18% of total adds occur in May/June BUT - 30% of drops occur in May/June

The above statistics are an average over the past three years of comparative data. But clearly, the percentages cited paint a clear picture that the months of May and June are crucial to whether or not we have a strong finish to our year-long race.

With that in mind, and considering the above quote from Yogi Berra, we still have work to do.

Club presidents – have you surveyed your members? Have you engaged your new members? Member satisfaction is all-important to the overall health of a club. It determines whether a member stays, or a member leaves. The new Membership Satisfaction Guide is a valuable resource all clubs should consult on a regular basis.

Take another look at the requirements for the <u>Club Excellence Award</u>—specifically the membership requirement. It says, "The club achieved a net growth in membership (including branch club members when applicable) or sponsored a new club..." Remember — you must achieve all requirements. Have you fulfilled the service requirement? There is still time to engage in a community project, like the <u>Reading Action Program</u>.

District governors – now is the time to survey the clubs in your district. You should also review the requirements for the District Governor Team Excellence Award.

Your actions and your success during the months of May and June will determine whether we struggle to the finish line, or take a victory lap in Hamburg!
