This was the site of the tree planting initiative by Leos. A total of 56 trees were planted. These included 6 fruit trees which were donated by Trust Academy Leo Club who were led by their incoming club President Leo Nyasha. There were 23 energetic Leos who attended this tree planting session including the Leo Region 2 Chair, Leo Amanda Moyo, and 2 Lions, Lion Jona Machaya the District Leo Chairperson and Lion Ronald Mujoma (Gun Hill co advisor under Harare West). Gun Hill Leo Club donated the other 50 trees which included pine trees, the indigenous savannah species and jacaranda.

Speaking after the project, The Headmaster of Alexandra Park Primary Mr Pamire warmly gave his thanks to the president and all the Leos for being environmental friendly youth. He argued the group to continue planting tree so that we have a better planet. when he learnt of the litter picking, he chanted, "That was very kind of you to have gone the extra mile."

The next stop is Herentals College Chitungwiza where about 350 trees are going to be planted on the 10th of December. This will be an exciting day as permission has already been by the Herentals Group of College's Chief Executive Officer. This will make the Gun Hill Leo Club near its target of 1000 trees before the end of the year. For now, 56 gone and 944 to go.



In response to the International President call to go green and plant trees, 1 MILLION trees in fact, the Leo took it upon themselves to take a leading role. the project was facilitated by Leo Hurst Semu, the Gun Hill Leo Club Projects Director and the Vice President, Leo Tafadzwa together with the Treasurer Leo Medusa Simango who made sure the day had no hitches. The easy part was getting the trees to site and the hard work began by digging the holes. With all the energy packed in the Leos it ended up light work despite the ground being dry. Each Leo planted a tree and so too did the Lions present, who did not want to be left out. Also of great assistance was Sekuru Samaita, the school grounds man who offered great help to get everything done on the day.

After the trees were planted, the group took to litter picking as the previous night, the school had hosted a fundraising concert. This concert included performance by renowned Zimbabwean Gospel musicians Pastor baba na Mai Charamba and Fungisayi Mashavave. It went on well and the Leos plan to make it an annual fundraising

My Fellow Lions and Leos,
We are now at the last month before the second half of the 2011-12 Lionistic year and we still have not been able to meet the target of a single district which is 1250. Our present total is 1210, our pace is certainly too slow and somewhat disappointing; we therefore have to double our efforts to retain the members that we have and recruit new members. We have done it in the past so what is preventing us from doing better now? I am therefore appealing to all of us to be proactive and focus our efforts on recruitment of members for the rest of this Lionistic year. **I will continue to emphasize that we are part of Africa and need to be within the continent's (Africa forum) and not on the outskirts.** I feel honoured to report that Central Mahalapye Lions Club is waiting for their Charter as they have submitted their application and all other documentation and paid their Charter fees. Watch the space to hear more about this club in our next issue.

I am really please to know that tree-planting activities are being carried out throughout our District and there are pledges to plant more, I am quite sure that by now we have surpassed our target. I would like to congratulate the team of Leos and Lions who planted fifty-six (56) trees (including fruit, indigenous, savanna species and jacaranda); these trees were donated by Gunhill and Trust Leo clubs. Francistown Nyangabwe Lions, Nyangabwe Leo Club and Tabitha Leos club also planted twenty-eight (28) trees in partnership with the School for the Deaf and Dumb in Francistown. Molepolole Lions club members were also involved in tree planting, starting with ten (10) plants where they were in partnership with the Council, schools and other Government departments; they have also committed to present a tree to the 1st child born on the 1st of every month; this began on 1st November. I am aware that Region 1 has planted over one thousand trees during the last Lionistic year and has pledged to surpass this target this year; which they hope to fulfill during the rainy season. More written information on tree planting will be viewed in our next issue.

Fellow Lions, we are not doing well on the issue of registration for our District's 2012 Convention, please remember that after December 31st the registration fees will increase, I am therefore requesting all of us to reflect on the importance of attending such prestigious occasions in our District's Calendar. Our registration figure to date is thirty-eight (38) delegates (excluding the Principal Cabinet Officers); more than 50% who still need to pay. I would also like to express my gratitude to PDG Lion Faisal Karim, SVDG Lion Clever Mugadza and Lion Willie Dhlandhlara for completion and submission of registration forms for Senior Lions Leadership Institute and Regional Lions Leadership Institute, respectively to be held in Kinshasa in February 2012. We wish these Lion Leaders all the best in the hope of being selected.

It's Time

The Inner Voice

Often referred to as the inner voice of reason, our conscience acts as our inner compass, providing us with our own personal navigation system. It can be our greatest friend if we only stop to listen: we ignore it at our peril. Much of the time we bury it, muffle it or give it less importance in our life. Our inner voice is our voice of wisdom. It speaks to us, providing clues and road maps to living life as it is meant to be lived: in accordance with natural spiritual laws. It is a tool that steers us towards living in harmony with everything around us. It urges us to balance our lives by helping us measure what we say and do, how we say and do it and what not to say (and do). It guides us to choose moral over immoral, good over evil, and acts of happiness over sorrow.

The primary objective of the conscience is to keep us safe in a space of peace and happiness: to prevent us from committing actions that will have a detrimental effect on others and ourselves. When we trust and follow our inner voice it ultimately awakens the mind to a purer awareness, a higher and more elevated consciousness.

The path of spirituality advocates that we nurture and listen to our conscience on a consistent basis. Mastery over the mind comes from listening, discriminating between right and wrong and, with conviction, following through with the good. Religions advocate we 'follow' which only makes us followers and not leaders. It is wise to not get stuck in the dogma, but to look at the deeper spiritual values religions offer. The wisdom is there, buried deep within, knocking... we just need to spend some time... listening.

If we return to the core of our soul being, we will find that at the deepest level, the conscience is pure and untouched, ultimately seeking only peace, love and happiness and wanting the same for others. This is why naturally we are able to separate good from evil, want peace over war, and know the difference between happiness and sorrow. Intrinsic to each of us is a memory chip that is never totally overwritten, no matter how 'bad' or 'evil' someone may appear to be on the surface. Sometimes we do or say things that we know are not 'right' and our conscience bites, reminding us that we have just violated our own deepest truth – gone against our grain. Einstein often referred to the 'inner voice' as the source of both moral and physical knowledge. Let's capitalize on that. The restlessness we sense inside is our misalignment of the feelings, words and deeds. It all sparks off with a feeling - the feelings never lie. Uncomfortable feelings are the alarm bells of our conscience, which alert us to a possible invasion of our true state of being. There follows a moment of choice, and the soul then needs to find the power to follow through with the 'right' action - but when it can't, we have given birth to a guilty conscience.

In the book *'The Unconscious Civilization'*, John Ralston Saul states that "In contemporary developed nations many people have acquiesced in turning over their sense of right and wrong, their critical conscience, to technical experts..." This is certainly true in many instances where as a consumer, we impulsively purchase without taking into account the limited resources of our planet. Have we lost our conscience and simply living in the moment, without any moral obligation towards our descendants?

It can happen that we can make erroneous judgments. However, whether out of ignorance or out of wrong intent, every individual is culpable for the misdeeds he commits. The law of action and reaction (sometimes called the law of karma) means that each one of us is responsible for the results of our own actions. We should therefore pay great attention to our thoughts and actions... for at some point, we will have to repay our debts or repent for our misdeeds. Listen to your inner voice carefully.

Corporate Social Responsibility is a positive move in the area of cultivation of social or collective conscience. Increasingly, companies and entrepreneurs, the likes of Steven Schussler, are exercising philanthropy as well as profitability: He states: "*Helping others while helping yourself is not counterproductive – it can even be synergistic.*" *Meaning, as we listen to and heed to our conscience we also uplift ourselves.*

It's time... to listen to the inner voice and not switch off the alarm when it goes off! Our conscience is our friend, not our enemy, we need not fear it. It is there to help us live and die as a better person. World peace can only come when we understand and implement our moral obligation to the greater whole and that means that each one of us, as a fundamental part of the collective, needs to heed our own conscience and 'clean up our act' accordingly.

Senior Lions Leadership Institute

The next Senior Lions Leadership Institute for Africa will be offered in Kinshasa, Democratic Republic of Congo on February 7-10, 2012. We seek your assistance to help recruit qualified Lion participants for the institute. It is a valuable opportunity to build on skills that enhance the leadership qualities at the zone, region and district levels.

The institute in Kinshasa is designated as a *Senior Lions Leadership Institute* and is targeted to Lions that have completed a successful term as club president, but have not yet attained the position of first vice district governor. Lions who are region and zone chairpersons, as well as second vice district governors, are encouraged to apply to this institute. Candidates do not have to hold a position currently (for details, see the enclosed application materials).

Lions Clubs International will pay for meals and lodging in strict accordance with the schedule of the institute. Additionally, LCI will make appropriate hotel reservations for each participant on a twin-share basis. Participants are responsible for all travel expenses to and from the designated venue inclusive to all relevant ground transportation charges.

Please help us to recruit qualified Lions for this institute by providing a copy of the application packet to Lions leaders in your district, including your district governor team, region and zone chairpersons, to remind them of this event. Please ask them to promote the institute and actively encourage qualified candidates to apply. The success of this institute depends on the participation of Lions leaders from across your constitutional area. The application packet is available on the web site, www.lionsclubs.org.

We will be accepting thirty four (34) Lions total, 22 in the English-speaking classroom and 12 in the French-speaking classroom.

MJF Program Announcement

Following the recent Board meeting in Hong Kong, LCIF has an important announcement to share with you regarding the MJF program. As LCIF Coordinators, we hope you will share this important development with the Lions of your district or multiple district.

Below are details regarding the expansion of the MJF program to include donations to five special program areas. Donors will now be able to receive MJF and PMJF credit when directing their support to:

- Disaster
- Humanitarian Needs (includes donations to the Measles Initiative)
- Sight
- Youth
- Area of Greatest Need

Restrictions beyond these five special areas will be honored by LCIF, but will not be eligible for MJF or PMJF credit. For example, a donation that is restricted to a specific disaster, such as an earthquake or tornado in a particular region, will not be eligible for credit toward an MJF or PMJF.

The MJF program was established by LCIF in 1971 to recognize unrestricted donations of US\$1,000. Today, more than 75% of the funding received by the foundation annually is given through the MJF program. By expanding the recognition program, LCIF is able to recognize more individuals while continuing to support its many programs. The expanded program will also offer additional benefits, including:

- Donors will now have the opportunity to direct support to a desired special area
- LCIF will be able to immediately provide funds for large-scale disaster relief, rather than collecting and distributing funds over a period of weeks or months

Funding directed to "Area of Greatest Need" provides LCIF with the ability to financially support any program within the four general areas. Donors are encouraged to consider this opportunity when making a gift.

Frequently Asked Questions about WMMR

Q:How do I logon?

A: Each user must first register a user name and password to access either the Directory or WMMR. Once you have completed the registration process, you will be able to enter your user name and password on the Logon page to access both systems.

Q:How do I register for a password?

A: First time users of either the Directory or WMMR, will click “New User? Click here to register now.” on the Logon page. You will be prompted to provide your LCI member number and other information to help us authenticate who you are. You will also create a user name and password that are unique to you. And finally, you will provide security questions and answers that can be used if you forget your user name or password.

Q:How do I change my password?

A: Once you have registered a user name and password, you can change them. First, go to the Logon Page. Enter your user name and password, select the “I want to change my password after logging on” checkbox and then click Submit. On the next screen you can change your user name or password or both.

Q:How do I change my e-mail address?

A:Once you have registered a user name and password, you can change the e-mail address associated with your registration. First, go to the Logon Page. Enter your user name and password, select the “I want to change my password after logging on” checkbox and then click Submit. On the next screen you can change your e-mail address as well as your user name, password or security questions and answers.

Q: Is access to WMMR or the Directory available to all Lions members?

A:Access to WMMR and the Directory is based on the member’s LCI office or role (e.g., club secretary, cabinet secretary, council chairperson or Past International President).

Q:Do I need to reply to the e-mail titled “LCI – CONFIRM PASSWORD PROFILE CHANGE”?

A: You will receive this e-mail whenever your user name, password or security questions were changed. The purpose of the e-mail is to protect your logon information from improper use. You only need to contact the Support Center if you DID NOT change your logon information.

Q:Do I need to reply to the e-mail titled “LCI - REGISTRATION COMPLETE”?

A:You will receive this e-mail whenever you complete the registration process. The purpose of the e-mail is to protect your logon information from improper use. You only need to contact the Support Center if you DID NOT change your logon information.

Q: What format is required for passwords?

A: The password must contain at least one letter (a-z or A-Z) or one digit (0-9). Passwords must be at least 6 characters. Passwords are case-sensitive. (E.g., these passwords are NOT equivalent “LION123” and “lion123”.)

Q:What happens if I forget my password AND I forget the answer to both of my security questions?

A: If you forget your username, password and security answers, contact the Support Center by e-mail (wmmr@lionsclubs.org) or by telephone (630-468-6900).

Q:Will I get my password mailed to me like last year?

A: No, we will no longer mail passwords to officers.

Q:Will I need to re-register next year?

A:No. Once you register a user name and password you won’t need to change it from year to year.

Q:Can I use a computer anywhere to access the Directory or WMMR?

A: Yes. Any computer with internet access can be used to access the Directory or WMMR.

Q:What if I get the message, “Your response does not match our records”?

A: To authenticate your identity, you will need to provide information as part of the registration process. Your entries need to match the values in our LCI membership records.

Q:“You have exceeded the maximum number of attempts allowed. Registration is not permitted at this time.” What should I do?

A:This error message means that one or more of the verification responses you typed do not match the values in the Club Roster or the Membership file. First, check with your club secretary or club president to determine the correct values. Then wait for approximately thirty minutes and attempt to register again.
