Hazen Lions part of benefits



MELVIN JONES WAS QUITE A FELLOW

For Lions the name Melvin Jones is a household icon. Strangely, however, not many know anything about the founder of Lions Clubs International, especially the early period of his life. I have done some in-depth research on MJ and would like to offer a two part series about him. This issue will focus on his early life.

MJ was born at Fort Thomas, Arizona on January 13, 1879. He was the son of United States Army Captain Calvin Jones and his mother was Lydia Gibler who nurtured her son through the constant threat of Indian raids. His father was under the command of General Nelson Miles, the namesake of the present city of Miles City, Montana.

Fort Thomas was a lonely outpost on the Gila River in Arizona and was only 40 miles or so from the center of the Apache Indian nation. The Apaches were led by Chief Cochise and a little later by Chief Geronimo. At that time, the Apaches were making a heroic effort to stop the western expansion of the white man. MJ's boyhood memories were a confusing and frightening array of blue-clad troopers, horses, bugles, war cries, wagon trains, gaunt settlers and dust. Massacres of both Indians and whites were quite frequent during this period.

In 1886 MJ, a lad of seven, found himself in Wyoming and Montana where his father had been relocated. After watching his father assist in the aftermath of the "Battle of the Little Bighorn," MJ's family made military stops in Missouri and Illinois where MJ obtained his schooling. In college MJ had difficulty deciding what to study, law or music, partly because he possessed a fine tenor singing voice. In his early twenties, however, he ended up taking a position in the insurance agency of Johnson and Higgins in Chicago.

MJ was intelligent and motivated and by 1913 he became the sole owner of the Melvin Jones Insurance Agency. It was about this time that he met and married Rosie Freeman who would go on to become the famous golfer, Rosie Jones. Because of this, MJ was quoted as saying, "I was perhaps the first golf widow on record."

One day when the 33 year old MJ was working in his office, a business acquaintance invited him to lunch to meet the members of the exclusive Business Circle of Chicago. MJ joined the club and in short order revitalized it and was responsible for rapid membership growth and the development of new initiatives and ideas.

In 1915, MJ became secretary of the Business Club and eventually became president. It was about this time when MJ's wife Rosie told him that "You're working yourself to death for other people without pay. Something needs to change." MJ's response was "Maybe I'm finding out that you don't get very far unless you start doing something for someone else."

Then, in 1916, MJ decided it was time for action. He contacted several clubs and organizations and talked to countless people to gauge the interest in forming a national service organization. By doing this he created enthusiasm for a new kind of community service based on volunteerism instead of simply writing a check.

As I complete my year serving as District Governor of 5NE, I want to, once again, express how much I enjoyed visiting the clubs in the District and getting to know more of the Lions in eastern North Dakota. Lions in our area are definitely carrying out the motto "we serve."

District 5NE Experiences a Net Increase in Membership

According to LCI's latest Club Health Assessment, District 5NE finished the year with a small increase in membership, a feat that has not been accomplished for a number of years. As I indicated in a previous article, our district has recruited an average of approximately 200 new members per year for the past eight years, but has seen 210-220 members drop their membership. The increase in membership this year resulted from two areas: (1) the number of members dropping their membership throughout the district was at an all-time low of 137 members and (2) there was a large growth in the number members joining the campus club.

Congratulations to all club leaders for keeping your members actively involved so they retain their membership; and congratulations to those involved with the campus clubs for your efforts that resulted in recruiting these young Lions. As a result of your actions, we accomplished our goals of reducing membership drops and recruiting more young Lions.

5NE is Facing a Leadership Challenge

District 5NE is facing a leadership challenge at the club level, as well as, at the cabinet level. The most pressing leadership challenge at the present time is the need for someone to "step up" to assume the position of 1stVice District of 5NE. When 1stVice District Governor, Fran Romsdal had to resign his position because of

health reasons, Past District Governor, Katherine Tweed volunteered to assume that position until a replacement could be found. A replacement was not found and she will now become District Governor July 1, 2013. Lion Rick Swenson from the New Rockford Lions was elected 2ndVice District Governor at the fall meeting; however, as a result of the action the 1stVice District Governors position is open and a candidate is being sought for the position beginning July 1st.

Serving as a Vice District Governor and District Governor has been a very rewarding experience for me. It has provided me with the opportunity to meet and work with a lot of devoted Lions on a local and international level. Qualified Lions are encouraged to consider taking advantage of the opportunity to serve Lions in this capacity.

Many local clubs are also facing challenges finding members willing to serve as officers in their local clubs and as a result they keep the same slate of officers year after year. This type of action not only robs members of opportunity to gain leadership skills by serving as an officer, but often negatively affects the club because of the lack of new ideas and strategies often gained by new leadership.

How Could the Governor's Cabinet Better Serve the Needs of the Local Clubs?

As the Lions year comes to a close one of the goals in District of 5NE's Action Plan that was not attained was to find ways to better focus on meeting the needs of the clubs in the District. According to District 5NE's Constitution "the object of the district organization is to provide an administrative structure with which to advance the purposes of Lions International in the district."

As previously indicated, those purposes according to Lions International are:

TO ORGANIZE, charter and supervise service clubs (Lions Clubs). **TO COORDINATE** the activities



and standardize the administration of Lions Clubs.

TO CREATE and foster the spirit of understanding among the peoples of the

TO PROMOTE the principles of good government and good citizenship.

TO TAKE an active interest in the civic, cultural, social and moral welfare of the community.

TO UNITE the clubs in the bonds of friendship, good fellowship and mutual understanding.

TO PROVIDE a forum for the open discussion of all matters of public interest; provided; however, that partisan politics and sectarian religion shall not be debated by club members.

TO ENCOURAGE service minded people to serve in their community without financial reward, and to encourage efficiency and promote high ethical standards in commerce, industry, professions, public works and private endeavors.

Considerable time, effort and money are devoted to carrying out the actions of the Governor's cabinet on a yearly basis and it is essential that we find ways to better focus the Governor's cabinet on serving the needs of the clubs in the district. Most often needs are better met when requests for assistance are generated from the local club level than when strategies are "handed down from above." I encourage local club officers to let their needs be known by providing input to the District Governor or a member of the District Governor's cabinet.

5NW DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S REPORT

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"Amazing things can happen when we don't give up."

We've spent a lot of time talking about getting new members. Sometimes we get tired of hearing about it. But whether we're looking for more help, someone else to take leadership positions, revitalization, invigoration, energy.... It all boils down to the same thing: We need new members.

We've got a lot of excuses, and even a few pretty good reasons, why getting new members isn't easy. We've all heard them, over and over.

Maybe we've been going about it all wrong. Maybe we're looking for people to replace us: people like us who will do the things we've been doing, the way we've been doing them.

That's looking into the past. The future of Lions clubs in our communities, depends on us looking into the future. The next generation of Lions will not be cookie cutter images of us. But they will be Lions. Doing things they can be committed to, and doing them their way.

My hat is off to the clubs that are vital enough to attract new Lions, and to the Lions who are enthusiastic enough to ask them to join their club. Twenty-eight of the 54 clubs that started the year, have added new members. That's just over half of the clubs. Thirteen of them have added three or more new members.

We've added 70 new members. With 1,466 members at the beginning of the year, it has taken, on average, nearly 21 members to sponsor one new one.

We've got less than a month remaining in this year. With just a little bit of effort, we could do a lot better.

We must. We've lost four clubs this year. Clubs that ran out of vitality because their membership hadn't been infused with the new life and enthusiasm that new members bring. Those four clubs had a total of 40 members, that weren't tired of being Lions, but were tired of trying to do it all by themselves, over and over again.

The best way to energize and revitalize

tired clubs, is with new members with new (and yes, different) ideas and goals. Members with enthusiasm to be part of the greatest volunteer service organization in the world. A new generation of Lions is waiting out there. Let's bring them in.

This has been an amazing year. Thank you all for all you do as Lions in your communities. Thank you for your hospitality as I visited your clubs, and giving me the honor and privilege of serving you as your District Governor.

"Amazing things can happen when it doesn't matter who gets the credit."

"I Believe" "In A World Of Service" "Amazing Things Can Happen." They happen best when like-minded people focus time, talent, and energy to achieve common goals.

I have learned that goals set by the heart are most often achieved, while we often struggle to reach goals set by the head. I have learned that goals set by Lions with a passion for what they do, are likely to be not only reached, but surpassed.

The entire theme I selected for my year as District Governor, is "Amazing Things Can Happen When It Doesn't Matter Who Gets The Credit." That theme describes the Lions who dedicate themselves to causes they are passionate about.

DISTRICT GOALS

If you ask the Lions of our district how well they did in achieving the goals they set with their hearts, the answer is, they did very well. The response is less exciting if you ask them how well they did with the goals they set because they thought they should, or because they were asked to set those goals by someone else.

There were truly amazing things happening in the communities where we have Lions: Benefits for people with serious medical conditions, and for communities that have suffered disasters. More quietly, but every bit as important, the scores of acts of kindness and assistance that often are not even known



outside that community. By Loving Individuals Offering Needed Services.

We didn't achieve our District goals for membership. The impact of losing four clubs dealt a devastating blow to that goal. We learned that clubs that have struggled for so many years, reach the point where continuing on can be overwhelming. We learned we must provide the assistance of leadership, programs and options, several years earlier, before it is too late.

We didn't conduct all the programs such as the Club Excellence Process, that we planned. We didn't conduct those programs as effectively as we might have. However, a number of clubs have recognized the need and value of those programs, and have committed to participate in them. While we've struggled with the mechanics, we've made great progress in making clubs aware of those tools, and creating the desire and commitment to implement them.

We didn't charter a new club, but have continued to build toward that end in several communities. We're exploring new avenues for clubs and club branches. Existing Lions Clubs near those communities have opened their arms to working with them. The first critical steps, finding sponsoring clubs and Guiding Lions, will be easy ones to make.

INVOLVEMENT IN INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMS

Continuing to plant trees, and financially supporting through the Lions Clubs International Foundation, the fights against Measles and Illiteracy, Lions in western North Dakota have connected with world-wide needs.

International President Wayne Madden's Certificate of Appreciation awards were presented to Lion Butch Frank of the New England Lions, Lion Lois Reierson of the Williston Korner Lions, and Lion Kelly Braun of the Dickinson Noon Lions.

Past District Governors Richard Christensen of the Watford City Lions and Dan Vondrachek of the Bismarck Capital City Lions qualified for the Senior Counselor Award. At the MD5 Convention they were recognized for 10 years of service as an active Lion since their term as District Governor.

OTHER TOPICS OF IMPORTANCE TO THE GOVERNOR

The 12th Annual Spring Rally and Leadership Conference hosted by the Garrison Lions was attended by 99 Lions from 29 clubs. It included club officer training for secretaries and treasurers. Those not present also received that material.

International Director Dave Hajny opened the conference with an emotionally inspiring address, setting the tone for afternoon sessions that definitely spoke to the hearts as well as the heads of the Lions in attendance. Focusing on what Lions do, the Rally fostered Lions' Pride, and developed Lions' Skills.

I am delighted by the emerging leadership in our district. Young and new Lions, eagerly stepping up to take positions of leadership and responsibility. Their personal growth, leadership development, and confidence, is a testimony to the many benefits and blessings of being a Lion.

This past year has certainly been one of the most rewarding and enjoyable years of my life.
