# Spring time, dog time, clean-up and fix-up time with friends and tail wags

Lions and Lions Clubs have been active supporters of the Service Dogs for America in Jud since it began in 1991 when Lion Edward W. Duden donated the land. The main work of the school is to prepare service dogs for people - something the staff devotes itself to doing every day. Dogs are trained for military veterans, and for people who need mobility assistance and emergency medical response. They are also trained for facilities such as nursing homes and courtrooms and for career change.

May 7th is the annual Spring Clean-Up Day at Service Dogs for America. Bring your work gloves and favorite gardening equipment, including hand trowels, weed whackers, shovels or whatever else you can think of. Volunteers are needed to keep the school in great shape. SDA sits on 10 acres of land on the south edge of Jud with 7,200 square feet of training and canine housing, 2,000 square feet of exterior kennels, 3,200 square feet of exercise yards, two client cabins, and 12,500 square feet in Lions Memorial Park. That's a lot of area to not only maintain but keep making better for clients and dogs.

We can all work together to help people in need of a service dog have a better quality of life by making the physical facility of Service Dogs for America safe, comfortable and serene. When volunteers come in and help with physical plant maintenance, we make everything better with our service.

Food is provided for volunteers for Spring Clean-Up Day. The Davenport Lions are donating funds toward food for the day and others bring goodies. The Jud Lions provide flowers that are planted by volunteers.

If you would like to donate or get more information about Spring Clean-Up Day please contact the school at 701-685-2242. This event really helps the dogs and staff so come and work with friends and fellow Lions. Please call and let them know you are coming for Clean-Up Day so they can plan enough food and treats!

Particularly, I enjoy providing clubs with the LCI resources they need to be successful. Our district governor team meets weekly via Zoom to discuss clubs' successes as well as their needs and concerns for moving forward. I contracted CO-VID in late January, and as a result, some visitations had to be rescheduled.

I'm happy to report that our service reporting in 5NE increased from 38% to 53% from January to March. We have a ways to go to achieve our goal of 80% by June 30th, but we are on the right track. Our total membership showed an increase of ten new members.

Our Spring Rally was held in Jamestown, ND, on Saturday, April 9th. Training sessions were conducted for our club officers and zone chairs. Our Keynote speaker was PID Pat Vannett. She always motivates and educates with her knowledge of Lionism. Thank you, Lion Pat.

Red River Lions Club in Grand Forks and the New Rockford Lions Club recently became Model Clubs, CON-GRATULATIONS. Two more clubs are in a good position to make the Model Club commitment. I will be visiting them soon, as they may not know how close they are.

One of the most important goals for district and club success is often overlooked. That goal is: TO REJUVENATE EXISTING CLUBS AND TO INCREASE MEMBERSHIP SATISFACTION. We put considerable emphasis on increasing membership; we should equally be concerned with MEMBERSHIP RETENTION. Lose one member and

you need to bring in two new members to show a growth.

When was the last time vour club conducted a 'Membership Satisfaction Survey'? I would venture to say most clubs have not conducted one for several years, if ever. Concerns usually come up when a club is experiencing some form of difficulty. If these concerns are not properly addressed, members may become inactive and eventually stop attending meetings. If this happens, assigned club members should call those frequently absent and ask them why they are not coming. I have found that the most successful clubs in our district conduct membership satisfaction surveys every 2-3 years. WHY NOT YOUR CLUB? Find out what talents and projects your new and more veteran members have and want, respectively. It's possible that some members feel that they are no longer important to the functioning of the club. It is important to keep your members active and engaged. If you do this, RETENTION WOULD NOT BE THE ISSUE THAT IT IS.

Your district governor and zone chairs can also provide these materials. If your club does not meet during the summer, now would a great time to do a membership satisfaction survey. This way your club could be off and running in the fall.

As we enter the last quarter of our Lions year, I hope all Lions and their families enjoy the spring, stay safe, and keep serving their communities.

ARTICLE I – DUTIES OF MULTIPLE DISTRICT OFFICERS

Page 2. Section 2. Multiple District Council of Governors

C) Decide the amount of surety bond for the Multiple District Treasurer and approve the surety company issuing said bond.

Page 2. Section 3. Multiple District Council Secretary and/or Council Treasurer.

E) Treasurer: Secure bond for the faithful performance of the duties in such sum and with such sureties as may be required by the Council.

ARTICLE II - ELECTION OF COUNCIL CHAIRPERSON

Page 2. Second last line

The council chairperson shall be elected by the District Governors and District Governor-Elects of the multiple districts provided that such chairperson shall be a current an immediate past district governor when he/she takes office. The council chairperson shall serve for a oneyear term only and cannot serve in that capacity again. A meeting of the district governors of the multiple district who will be in office during the term of the council chairperson elected shall be called following the multiple district annual convention, but no later than 30 days following the closing of the International Convention for the purpose of selecting a council chairperson.

ARTICLE VII – MULTIPLE DISTRICT FINANCE

ARTICLE VII

COUNCIL OF GOVERNORS (Current)

Section 1. Composition.

There shall be a Council of Governors composed of all the district governors in the multiple district and shall also include an immediate past district governor who shall serve as council chairperson. The officers of this multiple district shall be the members of the Council of Governors. Each member of the council of governors, including the council chairperson, shall have one (1) vote on each question requiring action of the council of governors. The council chairperson shall serve for a one-year term only and cannot serve in that capacity again.

Section 2. Officers.

The officers of the Council of Governors shall be a chairperson and vice-chairperson, secretary and treasurer and such other officers as the Council of Governors shall deem necessary.

#### ARTICLE VII

#### COUNCIL OF GOVERNORS (Proposed)

Section 1. Composition.

The Council of Governors, hereinafter referred to as the

A) The Current District Governors.

B) A number of immediate Past District Governors, which number cannot exceed one-half of the number of District Governors. There shall be at least one (1) immediate Past District Governor each from Saskatchewan, North Dakota, and South Dakota. The immediate Past District Governors shall be their respective State or Provincial representatives. In the event no candidate from a given state or province intends to seek a seat on the Council as State or Provincial Representative, there shall be an "at-large" election to fill said position from the remaining immediate Past District Governors.

C) The Council Chairperson, who shall have been elected by the current Council of Governors and the District Governors elect at the third quarterly (spring) meeting of the previous fiscal year. The Council Chairperson must have been a District Governor in Multiple District 5 in the fiscal year in which the election was held. The council chairperson shall serve for a oneyear term only and cannot serve in that capacity again. Each member of the Council shall have (1) vote.

Section 2. Officers

The officers of the Multiple District shall be:

A) The Council Chairperson. In the event a vacancy in the office of Council Chairperson the position shall be filled by the Vice Council Chairperson.

B) The Vice Council Chairperson of the Council, who shall be the immediate Past District Governor of the District in the state or province hosting the next Multiple District Convention. The Vice Council Chairperson shall fill the position of state or provincial representative for their respective state or province.

C) The State & Provincial representatives.

D) The Secretary-Treasurer or Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be, after application and interview process and if more than one qualified applicant, shall then be elected at the third quarterly (spring) meeting of the previous fiscal year serving a three (3) year term (limited to a maximum of 2 terms). These positions are subject to an annual review and may be replaced if deemed necessary

No salary shall be paid to any officer or member of the Council except for the Secretary-Treasurer or Secretary and Treasurer.
