The Mall hosts the event working with their stores to provide holiday specials to shoppers. In order for participants to gain access to the special prices, they must purchase a wrist band. The cost of admission, and the wrist band, is \$5.00 per person. This year all ticket sales were done on-line with the entire proceeds of the purchase being donated to non-profit organizations that made an application and were approved by West Acres. In the Gateway Lions application,

we stated that the funds we receive would be used to purchase eye exams and glasses for those in our community that could not afford glasses. We were approved.

The night of the event we were able to apply to volunteer to check people into the Mall, attach a wrist band to their wrist so that the merchants would know that they were eligible for their special prices, and sell tickets for \$5.00 to those who had not purchased tickets in advance. Hours that we worked were from 5:30PM to 8:30PM. We had six members at our table from 5:30PM to 7:00PM and six from 7:00PM to 8:30PM. Our Club was compensated by West Acres – the money that we collected from people who did not purchase a ticket online prior to the event was distributed equally to the organizations that worked the night of the event based on the number of workers that each organization provided.

November is the month for giving thanks, not just one day of eating. Let's take a look back at some of the service projects, meals and fundraisers accomplished by Lions clubs during the past 2 months:

- Ashley Lions - Appreciation steak dinner.
- Braddock Lions - weekly bingo games for most of the year plus a traditional ham dinner during Thrasher Days.
- Leonard Lions-Community Days parade and picnic
- Ellendale Lions- together, we served 80 steak dinners with funds for local projects.
- LaMoure Lions - golf tournament, Turkey Trot walk/run and silent auction, plus a Dec 4th Pancake breakfast with funds go to Phase 3 of Sunset Park toward a new community swimming pool.
- Enderlin Lions - Meals on

Wheels and rent of a tent for community events.

- Streeter Lions - Pancake breakfast serving over 100 people plus take-outs.
- Edgeley Lions - serving their traditional FREE Thanksgiving dinner to over 400 people including delivery to shut-ins.
- Kulm Lions - donating turkeys for traditional community Thanksgiving dinner that served over 80 people plus 12 take-outs and a few delivered meals to shut-ins with proceeds going to the local food pantry
- Chaffee Lions - members dug and bagged up 3,000 pounds of potatoes donated by a local farmer for county food bank.
- South Forks Lions - Meals on Wheels and placing food in backpacks for elementary students for weekend nourishment
- New Rockford Lions -

meal proceeds for local fire department, Veteran's Day blood drive, fundraiser for local volunteer ambulance service.

- Medina Lions- Fall Harvest Day with food, blood drive and bingo games.
- Lehr Lions - blood drive and welcome baskets to new residents.
- Strasburg Lions - served FREE sauerkraut and hotdogs to over 255 people in their community.
- Davenport Lions - together, we served over 150 people with hot dogs, cocoa and apple cider plus treats and games a Halloween party
- Pettibone Lions and Robinson Lions - each club holds their own Turkey Shoot which is a special day for card games to win a turkey.
- Jud Lions - donation to help local newlyweds who lost their home in a fire.
- Sterling Lions - weekly bingo games including turkey

or ham prizes before Thanksgiving.

- Wishek Lions - helped the Business Assn. serve a FREE sauerkraut and hotdog meal to over 1000 people.
- Zeeland Lions - weekly bingo games and future pinochle tournament.

From A to Z, these clubs are just a few examples of how Lions have continued to serve others this year. THANK YOU LIONS for raising money for those in need of glasses, people suffering from an accident or an illness, or in need of a Service-dog or a Leader-dog as well as community projects. Alone, one person can help a few people but WE SERVE TOGETHER in helping hundreds of people throughout North Dakota and beyond. Lions Foundation of North Dakota

When the Lions Foundation of North Dakota was founded in 2000, It was decided that no grants to North Dakota Lions Clubs would be awarded until a determined financial corpus amount was reached. At that time, interest earning rates were high, and were expected to provide much of the funding necessary

to award grants. Since then, interest earning rates have fallen to the point that those earnings are no longer providing adequate funding for grants.

It was later decided that undesignated donations to the Foundation, would be distributed 50% to the Permanent Fund, 25% to the Grant Fund,

and 25% to the Operations Fund. Current and recent donations do adequately fund operations, but provide limited funding for grants.

Refusing and limiting funding for grant requests, has discouraged clubs from seeking needed grants for their very worthwhile club projects.

One of the Foundation's

donor recognition programs is the Life Donor. A \$300 donation from a member, or in a member's name, receives a Life Donor lapel pin, and a Lions Foundation of North Dakota pin and bar for that member, and the club receives a Banner Patch. More than

Clubs are still recovering from the slow-down caused by COVID but they are now returning to their regular fund-raising and service projects. Christmas celebrations in towns across 5NE are happening. The four Lions clubs in Grand Forks are hosting the 20th Annual 'Christmas in the Park' in Grand Forks, ND. The fundraiser is headed by Lion Clair Zirnhelt from the South Forks Lions Club. The event runs from November 26th through New Year's Eve. Over the years, about \$350,000 has been raised and donated to local charities.

125 Lions have received this recognition. In recent years, almost half of them from just several Lions Clubs, who have used this as a means of honoring and recognizing members.

More than \$37,500 has been donated to the Foundation through this program. Just over \$9,000 of that amount would go to the grant program, according to distribution procedures. However, a club may designate the entire amount of that donation to go to the grant program.

There are 96 Lions clubs in North Dakota. If each club

honored just one of their members with Life Donor recognition each year, that would total \$28,800. If only half of that amount was designated for the Foundation Grant Program, it would add more than \$7,000 each quarter for the Grant Program. That money would find its way back to North Dakota Lions clubs for projects in their communities. Please consider this contribution method so that each year perhaps 100 Lions can be honored rather than just a few.

5NW DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S REPORT

Hello fellow Lions!

Merry Christmas to you. I hope you are all doing well, and I wish you the best for the upcoming holidays.

I recently did a review of how many Lions clubs were started over the years and it was interesting to see the results. These numbers do not include those clubs that we've lost, but, rather, it's just active clubs. Back in the 1920's, we had 7 new Lions Clubs in what is now 5 NW, or western ND. Bismarck Lions is our oldest club, going all the way back to 1921. In the 30's, we added 4 clubs; in the 40's there were 2 more; the 50's brought us 6; the 60's gave us 5 more; and in the 70's, we had 10 new clubs. We averaged 2 new clubs over the remaining decades.

What impresses me the most, when I think about new clubs committing to be a Lions Club in the 20's, 30's and 40's, was the vision those founding members had. Those were not really the best of times, so, for people to start a Lions Club just to help other people amazes me. Helen Keller once said, "the only thing worse than

being blind is having sight but no vision". My guess is that Helen Keller saw something special in the Lions. It was 1925 when she attended the Lions Club International Convention and challenged Lions to become "knights of the blind in the crusade against blindness." Because of her, Lions have always made sight a major goal. In fact, in 1971, the Board of Directors of Lions Club International declared that June 1 would be remembered as Helen Keller Day.

Sight has always been important to Lions, and I believe it always will be. Over the years, we have added other major causes as we simply continue to serve! We continue to focus on our motto, which is "We Serve". Stephen Covey, the famous author and motivational speaker, would agree with us. He said "The main thing is to keep the main thing, the main thing". We Lions stay

focused on serving, however, we aren't afraid to modify the focus of how we serve. As with time, life will always change and so will the needs of those around us.

A major part of staying on task is to plan and set goals. We understand that Lions will always serve but long-term planning helps us focus on the many areas of needs affecting our population. We also need to plan for the unexpected and that is what most likely was behind the creation of our Lions Foundation. The Foundation was a means to put aside funds to help for those unexpected needs. The Foundation became a reality because of planning and goal setting. Without doing all that there would be no Foundation today.

Planning our future is essential for all Lion Clubs to understand. We all need to plan, set goals with reasonable expectations and be

Stephen Covey said, "Live out of your imagination, not your history". The Lions emblem has two Lions profiles with each side facing away from the center. For us to have a future, we can't be afraid to change for the betterment of Lions and our Lion Clubs and to do that we need to put a plan in place. What is your plan, and goals for the upcoming year, the next five years? Think about it.
