Lion Blake will send out the reports electronically over the Internet when he receives them. We will refer to these reports at the meeting, but discuss only those items needing action.

Lions-Red Cross Initiative Takes Shape

DG Robert and Lion Dave Rogness, Project Alert Committee Chair, will roll out a new project in the coming months that builds a direct relationship between Lions Clubs and the American Red Cross. The first phase of the project is to increase awareness of the close relationship between Lions Clubs and the American Red Cross. The vision and mission statements reflect the same concern for service to communities, meeting humanitarian needs, encouraging peace, and promoting international understanding. Lions Clubs will be contacted in early February and encouraged to consider how they might add or enhance their service activities by supporting Red Cross efforts in their communities.

As Lion leaders in District 5NE, you will be asked to help to encourage local clubs to reach out to the local Red Cross chapters to support their efforts through service or financial means. A letter will be sent out in early February to encourage local club leaders to take up this item as part of their local agendas. There are many Lions clubs that already support the Red Cross, so establishing this connection should not be too difficult.

Then, the second phase of the initiative begins as the district will begin efforts to identify local groups of Red Cross volunteers in communities where no Lions Club current exists and work with these Red Cross and Emergency Managers and volunteers to start special interest Lions clubs. The creation of local Red Cross Lions Clubs will help to build membership in LCI and individuals who join these groups can take advantage of personal and professional development opportunities through training from the Red Cross and LCI, as well as utilize and enhance the unique skills and resources of club members. By creating Red Cross Lions Clubs, communities will be able to ensure the presence of volunteers ready to respond in times of emergency or natural and environmental disasters.

This second phase will take longer to accomplish, but the potential for mutual benefit is great! Lions increase their presence and numbers, while the Red Cross finds an organizational structure in communities that helps to keep their volunteers engaged in activities and programs in the absence of emergency or disaster situations. Club Visitation Reports

DG Robert will be in touch with all Region and Zone Chairs to gather information that is needed by LCI regarding service projects and club viability. This matter will be discussed at the Cabinet Meeting on the 15th. Zone Chairs can gather much of this information about service projects at their next zone meetings. However, DG Robert would like to have a written report from each Region and Zone Chair documenting club visitations. Reports for all clubs visited thus far should be sent to DG Robert by February 1.

Club visitation reports do not require too much detail. For example, the following information is all that is needed: Name of club visited; date of the visit; general impression of club's organization and strength; any suggestions for improvement. Region Chairs were asked to visit all their clubs in August and September to promote the state convention. These visits could be the basis for their reports. Zone Chairs were asked to visit all their clubs to introduce themselves and promote zone meetings. These visits could be the basis for their reports.

Need to Promote Donations to LCIF Development Fund

As district leaders, all cabinet members are asked to request that their local clubs donate to the LCIF during this fiscal year. The amount of the donation is not as important as the donation itself. We have a goal of increasing our district total by \$1000 this year. That is essentially one Melvin Jones Fellowship.

Last year, the following clubs in 5NE made no donation to LCIF: Argusville-Gardner-Grandin, Arthur, Ashley, Bowdon, Davenport, Devils Lake, Emerado-Arvilla, Gackle, Hazelton, Jamestown, Buffalo City, Jud, ND Campus, MayPort, Lakota, LaMoure, Turtle River, Leeds, Lehr, Linton, Medina, Napoleon, Pettibone, Sheldon, Sterling, Strasburg, Tuttle, Wing, and Zeeland Dakota.

Cabinet members are asked to contact club leaders to request a donation to LCIF this year. Personal contact may help to increase interest in LCIF—our International Foundation. With the threat of flooding again this spring, District 5NE may very well again be a recipient of LCIF emergency funding.

LCI Improvements to WMMR Reporting Process

The Lions Club Service Activity Report was recently redesigned to provide clubs with additional tools to measure the impact of their work, monitor their service, and share information with others. In late January, a new release of the WMMR-based report is being deployed with several new features especially developed with the district in mind.
