The last bottle brought tears to a man's eyes as he told me about his daughter's recent medical ordeal. She had just arrived back home. He was there for 2 to-go lunches and would share his special gift with her.

6. Then off to La Moure, also June 19th, as Lions grilled up and sold almost 400 BBQ Chicken dinners at the Rededicated Sunset Park. Thank you, President Mitch Carlson, It was fun to hand out Dad's to all the fathers and help turn the grate full of chickens over the coals. One fellow said his gift from Lions was going home to a shelf in his man cave.

7. Linton Lions once again



sponsored Dad's for Dad's. Thanks Lion Mark Heidrich for using your restaurant, The Grill to hand out liquid joy on Father's Day.

8, 9, and 10. Mapleton, Medina, and Napoleon - Their Lions clubs gave the gift of Dad's to dads.

11. New Rockford Lions-PDG Rick Swenson and Club Sec. Kristi Swenson had to pick up their 20 full size liters in Grand Forks. Worth the effort to serve over 50 root beer floats at their town's gazebo in the park.

12. Oakes Lions invited me to their club's fish fry in the park. Another great way to share Dad's with Dads.

13. Zeeland Lions-Rather than just handout Dad's bottles again at their June 16th community picnic, Sec. Gary

Wolff, Lion Vivian Schaffner, and I made over 40 root beer floats.

With my Service team, it took one month of trips to 8 grocery stores and 3 hardware stores in 4 cities to accomplish this service project. In addition to hauling bottles to most of these towns in my red Mini-Cooper, a "Thank You" goes to PDG Katherine Tweed of Fargo Lions for picking up 12 cases (144 bottles of Dad's), to Fargo Gateway tail-twister Mike Little for donating 4 more cases, to PDG Dave Butler of Fargo Lions for 6 cases and to PDG Rick and Lion Kristi Swenson for helping with this project. Let's add another 400 faces to the Miles of Smiles!!

Wow, it has finally arrived. I am happy, humbled, and pleased to serve as your district governor (DG) for the 2021-2022 Lion's year. I want to thank Eunice Cameron, PID Rob Hill, and PCC John Emmett for their excellent training along the way. Appreciation also goes to PID Connie LeCleir-Meyer. She prepared the way for 20 DGE Lions to take the DG oath of office during the virtual, LCI Convention on June 29th.

I also want to thank everyone who has agreed to serve on my cabinet this year. Some key positions are still available. Please contact your zone chair or DG team if you desire to have a leadership role in our district. We are still seeking a dedicated Lion to step-up for the 2nd VDG position. We need to have a candidate in place by August-September so they can be considered at our State Convention in Watford City this October.

To have a successful year as your DG, I will need the support of Lions in each of our 52 clubs. Every Lion in our district is unique and important. We must remember our strength as Lions starts at the club level and travels up to the district,

not the other way around.

As we progress out of the shadow of COVID-19, I know clubs are still having issues. During this difficult time, our past Lions Clubs International (LCI) President, Dr. Choi, has encouraged clubs to reflect on their past successes, regroup, plan, and then act. Your DG team is committed to helping clubs improve by providing the resources they need to get back to where they want to be. Lions are very resourceful. We have had to find new, innovative ways to serve our communities and a virtual meeting platform was fast-tracked.

Our 5NEs district goals have been submitted to LCI. Our District Governor's Team (DGT) and our Global Action Team (GAT) looked ahead 3 to 5 years in establishing these goals. We could have set our goals low so we would be guaranteed to meet them. Instead, we set our goals high so we can celebrate our successes as we achieve them. These goals are available on the LCI website. If you desire, I can send you a copy.

Briefly, our goals are focused on: (1) re-establishing a ladder of leadership, (2) assisting clubs in reporting service hours (3) rejuvenating existing clubs and increasing membership satisfaction, (4) encouraging clubs to conduct a community needs assessment to find new and relevant service projects, (5) looking for communities where we can establish new clubs, whether it be a branch, specialty, Leo, or a full 20 member chartered club, and finally (6) increasing our individual and club support of LCIF and increasing the number of model and 100/100 clubs in our district.

Our success as a district is dependent on us collectively increasing our TWO-WAY COMMUNICATION between clubs, zone chairs and our district governor team. Virtual zone chair meetings will be conducted during the year. This will enable us to share our experiences and jointly assist each other in addressing issues that are common across zones.

Our first District 5NE Cabinet Meeting is scheduled for

August 14 at the ND Vision Services/School for the Blind in Grand Forks. It will start at 10 am and run until noon. The first week in August I will send an email requesting that cabinet reports be sent to Tracy Wicken, our District 5NE secretary.

The theme of our newly elected LCI President, Douglas Alexander is 'service from the heart'. He believes, "service to others is the rent we pay for the space we occupy on earth".

I look forward to meeting each of you during my year as DG. Have a great and safe Summer.

Gateway Lions Celebrate

The Gateway Lions Club of Fargo was chartered on January 6, 1961. If you do the math that means the club is 60 years old. The club wanted to have a 60th anniversary celebration in January, but the Covid-19 Pandemic took care of that. The club was finally able to hold their celebration on June 17. The evening started out with a social at 6:00 PM. The wonderful meal was served at 6:30 by the staff at Country Inn & Suites. The meal was concluded by a piece of 60th Anniversary cake and a special treat of Dad's Root Beer provided by Lion Crystal Dueker.

The program was started by a few words from President Darrell Costain. 2nd VDG Scott Hildre gave some remarks about the history of the Gateway Lions Club. A few of his remarks are as follows: 1) the club was chartered on January 6 1961. The Sponsoring club was the Fargo Lions Club; 2) the Gateway Lions Club sponsored the Centen-

nial Lions Club and was later renamed the Bi-Centennial Lions Club; 3) the Gateway Lions Club started the Lions All Star Basketball Games in 1976 (this year will be the 45th year of the games); 4) the Gateway Lions Club and the Bi-Centennial Lions Club merged in 2002. PCC Duane Zwinger continued giving some remarks regarding the Gateway Lions Club. His remarks were more about the

accomplishments of the club in the past few years. Some of the highlights include: 1) Membership has increased from low 33 members to a present total of 46; 2) the club will sponsor the Lions All Star Game for the 45th year in July (the games are the main fundraising project for the club); 3) the club donated about \$30,000 each year to various projects and organizations. The club gives most of this money during the State Convention "Parade of Greens" and "Giving Hearts Day" in February; 4) the Gateway Lions Club is a "Model Club" for LCIF, meaning we will donate \$500 per member to LCIF; 5) the club does many service projects during the year, two of them include the screening of children with the "Sight 4 Kidz" program and assisting parents/guardians to pay for exams and glasses if they are unable to afford them; 6) the club has won many awards the past few years: Club Excellence Award, Club of the Year for 5 NE and MD5, Scrapbook contest, Website contest for 5NE just to name a few

You can see by the accomplishments why the Gateway Lions Club is one of the

MD5 Lions Convention Summary

When a small group of Lions from Grand Forks, District 5NE, began meeting in 2015 to plan the 2021 MD5 Lions Convention, little did we know that the end result would be anything like what we started out to achieve. We had bookings with the Alerus Convention Center and the Canad Inn Hotel; hospitality arrangements with the Greater Grand Forks Convention and Visitors Bureau; meetings with the MD5 Council of Governors; packets of planning information and reports to review from the Council and from previous convention hosts; and, attendance at MD5 Conventions between then and now. All with the idea of being the host District for an event that could bring perhaps 200 active and enthusiastic Lions to Grand Forks for three days of Lionism at it's best!

And then...the COVID 19 pandemic hit. The world as a whole changed and along with it, so did the Lions world. Keep in mind that the 2020 MD5 Convention scheduled by District 5SE to be held in Brookings, SD, was cancelled due to the pandemic. In October 2020, the Multiple District Council of Governors made the decision that we were to suspend our plans for a "live" convention and to move forward with a "virtual" convention. The border with Canada was closed to visitor traffic which meant that Lions from Saskatchewan would not be able to attend in person. Social distancing, mask wearing, limited crowd sizes and life-threatening health concerns became the new normal.

Basically, the convention planners had to completely

re-think how to coordinate and implement the various aspects of a Multiple District 5 Convention with the goal of holding on to the traditions of MD5 while presenting them in a new way. We believe we achieved our goal.

The Convention theme, "100 Years of Unity through Diversity" reflects the 100 years in which Multiple District 5 has been in existence. Unity and Diversity are cornerstone qualities of Lionism and are especially true in regard to our international relationships. This year we honored five Lions clubs who were chartered in 1921: Sioux Falls Downtown Lions, April 1, 1921; Fargo Lions, May 7, 1921; Bismarck Lions, September 2, 1921; Aberdeen Lions, October 8, 1921; and, Rapid City Downtown Lions, November 22, 1921. There were also Saskatchewan Lions Clubs that were part of a Constitutional Area chartered 100 years ago. We asked the Presidents of these clubs to submit a short video from five of their Lions to say something about what it means to be a Lion, especially in a club with 100 years of history. The recordings that we received were edited and put together by South Forks Lion Bryon Novotny into a professional video presentation.

The Service of Remembrance featured the reading by each District Governor of all the deceased Lions within the Multiple District for the past two years. There were 172 Lions on that list. We were honored to have Past International President Bill Biggs as the Eulogist.

The "100 for 100" ceremony led by Past International Director Robert Littlefield, was a new element this year. The goal of naming 100

Melvin Jones Fellowships or Progressive MJ Fellowships was far surpassed with the naming of 203 recipients.

The Red Jacket Ceremony took on a new twist by having each of the incoming District Governors appearing live in their home location, on Zoom. Council Chair John Emmett read the biographies of each individual.

Our International Guest and keynote speaker was Past International Director Robert Littlefield. He was introduced by Past International Director Pat Vannett. Lions Kathy Littlefield, Freda Hill and Audrey Reid were the authors of a new version of the Senior Councillor Social Awards program by adding a "roast" as a way to have a little fun. PID's Robert, Pat and Marvin Chambers announced the recipients of numerous awards, including Presidential Awards, given annually to deserving Lions. The Opening Ceremonies keynote speaker was internationally known entertainer Mark J. Lindquist. Three Club Training workshops were presented: Membership by PDG Sherry Fetch; Succession Planning by VDG Jeanette Bean; and, Lion Orientation/Re-orientation by DG Kevin Bean. The final two informational sessions were: New and Notable in Diabetes Care by Dr. Eric Johnson, Grand Forks; and, New Voices Celebration of Service by Lion Crystal Dueker and DG Kevin Bean. An evening Fun and Games

trivia event was led by Lion Roger Johnson, South Forks Lions of Grand Forks.

MD5 Council Chair John Emmett presided over the entire Convention and was a tremendous leader and friend throughout the year not only in convention planning but in all things associated with the Multiple District. CC John's final duty at the convention was to "pass the gavel" to the newly elected Council Chair, currently the District Governor for 5NW, Kevin Bean.

Finally, a special note of gratitude goes out to the three Lions who were most instrumental for making sure the technology was in place in order for the convention to run so smoothly. PDG Mel Olson was the key person who coordinated and gave leadership to each and every portion of this electronic event, never before attempted by the Multiple District. 5NW District Governor Kevin Bean and Lion Evan Romuld, Mandan Lions, were the final "pieces to the puzzle" who, with their experience, expertise and dedication, made it all possible. So much of the work is behind the scenes and goes unnoticed by viewers as we sit in our homes and participate in such a unique event. Hours and hours of planning go into making the final product.
